GRAND TRIBUTE PAID BY HON. G. W. ROSS, PREMIER OF ONTARIO

To the Memory of the Late Principal Grant-Refounded Queen's University-Left Memory to the Historian.

Hon. George W. Ross, Ontario's premier, was warmly received when he arose to deliver a tribute to the memory of the late Principal Grant at the memorial service in Convocation Hall, Thursday afternoon. He felt highly honored, he said, in being invited to take part in the service, and to bear testimony to the work Dr. Grant had done for education and for Canada.

Principal Grant was a great educationist. I do not speak of his work as principal of Queen's University-that speaks for itself. These halls and corridors are still resonant with his voice. The stately pile of buildings on the campus tells the story of his untiring energy and his capacity for rousing into activity the laggard generosity of his countrymen.

It was in this spirit that Principal Grant demanded for all races and creeds equality under the law. And how much of bitterness and hate and prejudice the spirit of the principal would remove. How much theological and political and racial, and even acedemical contention would give way before its benign influence.

With all his anxiety for the improvement of an arts' course on literary lines, Principal Grant had a keen perception of the practical advantages to the student and to the country of an important part of the establishment of a Mining School within easy reach of the university. It was this conviction that extended the old laboratories of Queen's, and it is through the practical working out of this conviction that you are able to gather in this city a class of young men with knowledge of geology, mineralogy and metallurgy, and the development of the natural resources of the province.

AWAY THEY GO. QUEEN'S RUGBY TEAMS OFF FOR TORONTO.

Big Intercollegiate Matches There Tomorrow-Strachan Will Likely Play Centre Half For Both Teams.

Queen's rugby teams left at one o'clock this afternoon for Toronto. The second team has a lead of eleven points over Varsity II, and should easily maintain it. The senior team will play a stronger and different style of game to that of last Saturday. Queen's are not saying much, but all the same they have strong intentions of defeating Varsity before the people of Toronto. The teams will likely be composed thus:

Queen's I.-Full back, Simpson; half backs, McDonald, Strachan (centre), Kearns; quarter, McDowall; scrum-wings, Sherriff, Donovan, Platt; inside wings, Branscombe, G. Reid; middle wings, Britton, J. Falkner; flying wings, Murphy; outside wings, Williams, Young, spares, McLennan, Forsythe, Connell.

Queen's II.-Full back, Tett; half backs, Ferguson, Strachan, Crothers; quarter, Pannell; scrum-wings, Thompson, Gillies, Malloch; wings, Harpell, Patterson, Bailey, F. Reid, Mahood, Malone, Murphy.

The Varsity senior team to meet Queen's in the Varsity athletic field will be: Full back, Laing; halves, Biggs, Beatty, Gibson; quarter, Fleck; scrum-wings, Tanton, Cochran, Burwell; wings, McLennan, Pearson or Bonnell; Patterson, Hoyle, Jermyn, French, Snively or Young.

Only four Kingston football teams play in Toronto tomorrow. Russell Bowie will again be captain of the Montreal Victoria hockey team. The Limestone were unable to arrange a match at Deseronto tomorrow.

The Canadian Horse Breeders' association has decided to hold a united show in February. It is another addition to the Limestone ranks. He will play on the half-back line. Guelph will have a strong hockey team. Its rink will be one of the finest in Western Ontario.

DENY STATEMENTS Made by Non-Union Men-Strikers After Them.

Richard Stockhill, secretary of the Machinists' Union, called at the Whig office this morning, and made the following reply in regard to the statement given by Messrs. Tait and Hopkins, non-union employees of the Locomotive works:

"I deny the charges that these men make. In reference to Tait, he was never employed by the Scranton schools; he was engaged only as helper on the Ottawa. He came to Kingston to do a contemptible act-that is, taking the position of a striker. Evidently he is now out of a job. He says they are not 'scabs'. Evidently the cap fits, so why should they not wear it?"

"In regard to Hopkins: He says we demanded his resignation from the Scranton schools. I emphatically deny that. He was not only one of the first men to come here to take a striker's place, but he repeatedly went out in search of others to do the same. He went to Brockville to escort to Kingston men who had been engaged by Mr. Pelletier. He was known to have made his way up, with others, from Montreal, playing a gramophone to earn their meals."

Mr. Stockhill displayed the correspondence he had had with the schools. He wrote to the Toronto superintendent, asking if a man named Tait was employed in this district. The reply was in the negative. However, he had worked in a private way at Ottawa, but was in no way connected with the schools. D. E. Vail, the Montreal superintendent, was asked the same question concerning Tait and Hopkins. In reply, he gave the same information about Tait, but mentioned nothing about Hopkins.

"This," continued Mr. Stockhill, "is the only correspondence we have had in the matter. If these men were discharged, which I do not believe they were, it was owing to nothing we did. We are watching them, and we will certainly continue to watch them. We are after them, and everyone else who does us such injury. The strike is not over. It is on just as strong as ever. We have no right to call it off, locally, I mean."

What Is Looked For In Locomotive Circles. The young men who compose the mechanical drawing class at the Y.M.C.A. are, for the most part, employees of the Locomotive works. They are over twenty-five in number. They state that they have been assured that the capacity of the works will be materially increased, so that in a year or so an engine can be turned out each day, instead of one each week as at present. Then, also, 1,000 men will be employed, instead of 400 as now. The increased capacity will create many positions in the drafting rooms, the offices, etc., and to fit themselves to fill these positions the young men above referred to are putting in some hard training. They recognize that considerable theoretical knowledge is necessary, and they are exerting their energies to acquire it. The company has done everything possible to stimulate their endeavor, even going so far as to purchase many sets of instruments with which to carry on the work.
