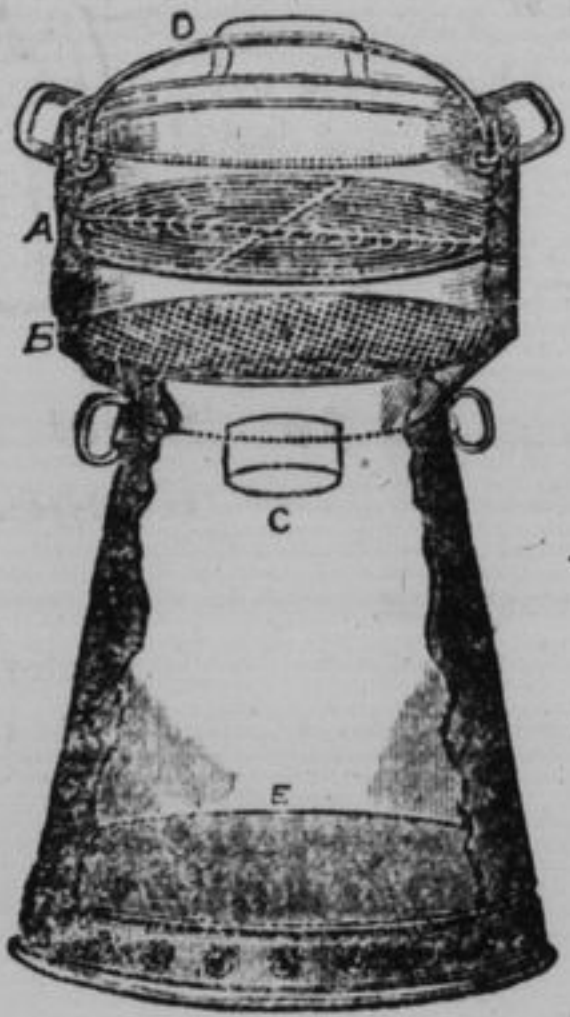

NEWS OF WORLD

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody - Notes From All Over - Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The Union Bank at Arcola, N.W.T., was burned. Two men were killed by a fire in the New York Times office.

Berlin, Oct., has increased its police force by three additional men. James J. Corbett receives \$750 a week for doing a monologue stunt.

Fifteen thousand striking French miners voted to continue the strike. It is reported that the Berlin Sugar company is importing Chinese work men.

A Bradford, Ont., man has been ordered to pay his divorced wife \$35 a week alimony. A British cooling station has been established on Burarion Island, in the Western Pacific.

St. Mary's has carried the by-law fixing D. Maxwell & Sons' assessment at \$25,000 for ten years. United States Secretary Hay and the British ambassador have signed the Newfoundland reciprocity treaty.

The Page-Hersey Iron & Tube company has been incorporated with \$500,000 capital and head offices at Guelph. A mammoth heavy draught horse show will be held by the Ontario breeders at Toronto and Guelph in February.

Admiral Sir Edward H. Seymour, G.C.B., O.M., has been appointed first and principal naval aide-de-camp to King Edward. Alfred McDougall, the Ontario government official, under arrest in Toronto, has been admitted to bail in the sum of \$25,000.

The discovery of another Carlisle plot at Barcelona, Spain, has been followed by the arrest of a number of the leaders of the movement. Two hundred and sixty vessels, representing a total tonnage of 28,888, were built in Canada during the fiscal year, ending June 30th.

The grand jury at Winnipeg returned no bill in the case of Gustave Mueller, charged with the murder of his wife. He was discharged. There are at present 60,000 Chinamen in Cuba, and since the island became independent there is no law to prevent them going there.

Masagni, the Italian composer was arrested in Boston as a result of the disagreement with his managers. Bail in the sum of \$10,000 was accepted. Nineteen and three-quarter knots was the speed developed at her official trials by the new Austrian battleship Hapsburg, built at Trieste, on Friday. She carries forty-three guns.

Investigation at Washington shows that a Philippine priest died from the "water cure" administered by Vermont volunteers, who have since been mustered out of service and cannot be reached. Architects in New York are at work on plans for a great philanthropic institution on the lower east side modelled after the Hull house, in England. According to the New York American, the institution will be erected by the bride of Bishop Potter.

Shot a Large Lynx. While Christopher Kelso, Portmouth, was hunting in Breeden's bush, north of the asylum farm, on Saturday, he ran across some bigger game than he was looking for. He discovered a large lynx in a tree, and a well-aimed shot brought the animal to the ground. One of its legs was broken by the fall. The lynx measured fifty-two inches long, and weighed over fifty pounds. Hundreds of people viewed the animal yesterday. Lynx are very scarce in the settled parts of Ontario, and the shooting of one is a rare occurrence. Those who claim to know state that this animal was a lynx.
