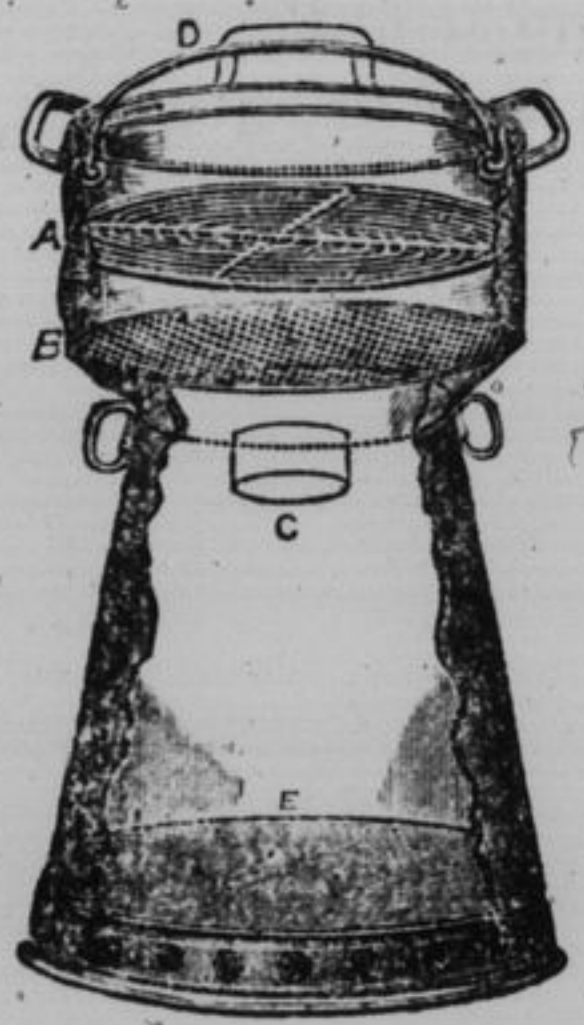

Opiter per Orbem Dicor. CANADA'S MEAT SUPPLY.

The meat supply of Great Britain has become a serious question. The trade with Canada and the United States has fallen off and the exports from Argentina, has dropped by reason of the heavy shipments which have been made to South Africa.

According to the London Stock Journal a deputation recently waited upon the president of the Board of Trade to request that the restrictions upon the importation of live stock from Argentina be removed.

Canada is interested in the movement. Had the restrictions been removed from the Argentine trade the Dominion would have had a grievance against the exactions which have been enforced with respect to its cattle.

REQUESTS FROM TEACHERS.

A deputation of teachers waited upon the minister of education on Friday and asked for the following things:

- 1. That the age limit for teachers be raised from eighteen to twenty-one.
2. That the training term in model schools be lengthened.
3. That the graduates of the Ontario Normal Colleges, who are not also graduates of a model or normal school, be not allowed to teach in a public school.

It will be observed that the tactics of the medical men have been adopted by the teachers. They want the standard of qualification raised as a means to an end and that end a reduction in the supply of teachers.

The people generally will not endorse the recommendation of the teachers in regard to Bible teaching. Who authorized the deputation to present this request to the minister of education? The Ontario Educational Association? What right has it to dictate as to what shall be done about the religious education? The masses are interested in this question, and the masses must be consulted about it.

NEWS OF WORLD

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody -Notes From all Over-Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered by the Dear Public.

A confidence man passed a lot of forged cheques on Guelph merchants. S. H. Ghent, deputy clerk of the crown, died suddenly in Hamilton. Ninety-six persons were drowned in the wreck of the steamer Elingamite, off the Australian coast.

John Mitchell announces that he will be a candidate for the presidency of the American Federation of Labor. The Toronto city council, on Monday night received the application of the Toronto Steel company for a site. Hon. Edward Blake, M.P., and John Dillon, M.P., will address a meeting in Toronto on December 1st.

An owl has been struck on the 13th concession of Raleigh township, that is said to yield a barrel a minute. The Toronto city council has decided to accept and to bring on to Toronto the cargo of Welsh coal now in transit.

Hon. James Sutherland, minister of public works, and Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, minister of marine and fisheries, will be sworn in to-day. The Indian finances for the year will admit of a grant of \$7,500,000 for drought and famine sufferers and still show a surplus exceeding \$8,500,000.

The story that the G. T. R. would erect a new hotel on the old parliament buildings' site in Toronto, is denied by the authorities at Montreal. The French naval estimates for 1903 are less by 106,000 francs than those for last year. They include seventeen million francs for works at various naval bases.

The new East River bridge, in course of construction between New York and Brooklyn was badly damaged by fire and two Montreal bridge workers are reported to have been killed. The chamber of mines, Johannesburg, has agreed to a proposal that higher wages be paid natives employed in the mines, the average being fixed at fifty shillings a month.

Prince Von Kulkenberg, German ambassador to Austro-Hungary, has been relieved of his post and will be succeeded by Count Von Wedel, the present German ambassador to Italy. The great race of five jute steamships from Calcutta to Dundee furnished a remarkable finish, four of the vessels reaching the bay within an hour of each other. The British steam Dragonian finished first, fifteen hours ahead of the other four.

NEW FILM-FLAM SCHEME.

Ingenuous Trick That Puzzles Even the Up-to-Date Barkeeper.

New Orleans Times-Democrat. "The thing in the way of film-flam now, and the real thing," said an old detective, "is aware ahead of any of the old tricks I know anything about. It has been worked but once in New Orleans, as far as I know, and it is what has ever been worked in any other place I do not know anything about. The business of finding a pocket book, sprucing the barroom, as it is called, the lock trick, which, by the way, is one of the smoothest of the whole list, and all the others are cheap and clumsy in comparison with the clever scheme that was worked on a downtown bar-keeper a few evenings ago. It shows one thing, and that is that the criminal classes are quite as active mentally and otherwise as men who are engaged in the decent callings of life. They are probably more active mentally than the men who are ground into narrow grooves because of ceaseless toiling in an effort to keep the wolf away. The new film-flam scheme is wonderfully simple, and is worked on paper as follows: \$1 and \$5 bills are needed. Of course bills of higher denomination could be used, but the two men who worked the trick here, used the bills of the first denomination—a \$1 and a \$5 bill. It is worked in this way: One of the men will write in thin lettering on the back of the \$5 bill what is supposed to be a list of his laundry. For instance, in this way: 'The prominence of my collar, two pairs of cuffs. He will go into a saloon when there is a rush in order to further minimize the possibilities of the bar-keeper's detecting the scribbling on the bill, and will call for a drink.

The money is put in the drawer, the man gets his drink and his change, and walks out. Directly his partner walks in, calls for a glass of beer and tender's a \$1 bill in payment. The bar-keeper throws out ninety-five cents in change. 'You made a mistake, old man,' the purchaser will say: 'I gave you a \$5 bill.' A polite wrangle follows. The fellow is insistent, says he can't had one with such a small change, and that was a \$5 bill, and he remembers to have jotted down a list of his laundry on the back of it. He calls for the boss, tells him of the dispute, and asks him to see if he has a \$5 bill with 'one shirt, two collars, two pairs of cuffs' written on it in pencil. Sure enough, the bill is found and the man gets his \$1.35 in change. This is the scheme they worked on the man down town, and he had no idea he had been swindled until he thought over it for some time, and then the whole plot dawned upon him. It is a clever scheme, but one that will not last, as bar-keepers are awfully quick to get on to tricks of this sort."
