SHEEP DOGS ARE CAUSING DESTRUCTION

They Aided and Abetted Wolves in Their Depredations -There is Much Alarm Among the Sheep Owners ...

Hull, Que., Nov. 12.-Wolves have killed much valuable stock recently belonging to farmers in this locality. and now the herds are threatened by a hitherto unsuspected enemy - fierce dogs which have deserted the homes of their owners and joined the wolf packs. These renegace dogs are much fiercer and have greater destructive powers than the wolves, and the farmers are alarmed. The depredations of wolves among the sheep have been enormous. A farmer living near here was disturbed by the howling o wolves recently and determined to drive home his restless herd of sheep. His sheep dog, a powerful half-breed, accompanied him. The farmer had re cently had doubts of the honesty of this dog. On this occasion the dog apparently worked with great zeal, driving the sheep near a corner of the field, when a pack of wolves sprang out and killed three sheep. The dog had deliberately driven the sheep within reach of the wolves.
