TREATY SIGNED

IT NOW AWAITS RATIFICATION OF SENATE

Differential Duties—Treaty Provides Against Their Imposition by Newfoundland—A Boon to the States.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 12.—Premier Bond received a cable to-day from the British ambassador at Washington, informing him that the reciprocity treaty between the United States and Newfoundland had been signed by Secretary Hay and himself, and now only awaits the ratification by the United States senate.

Differential Duties.

Washington, Nov. 12.—An important feature of the reciprocity treaty just negotiated with Newfoundland is a safeguard against the differential duty in favor of all goods entering Newfoundland from England or of the British Colonies.

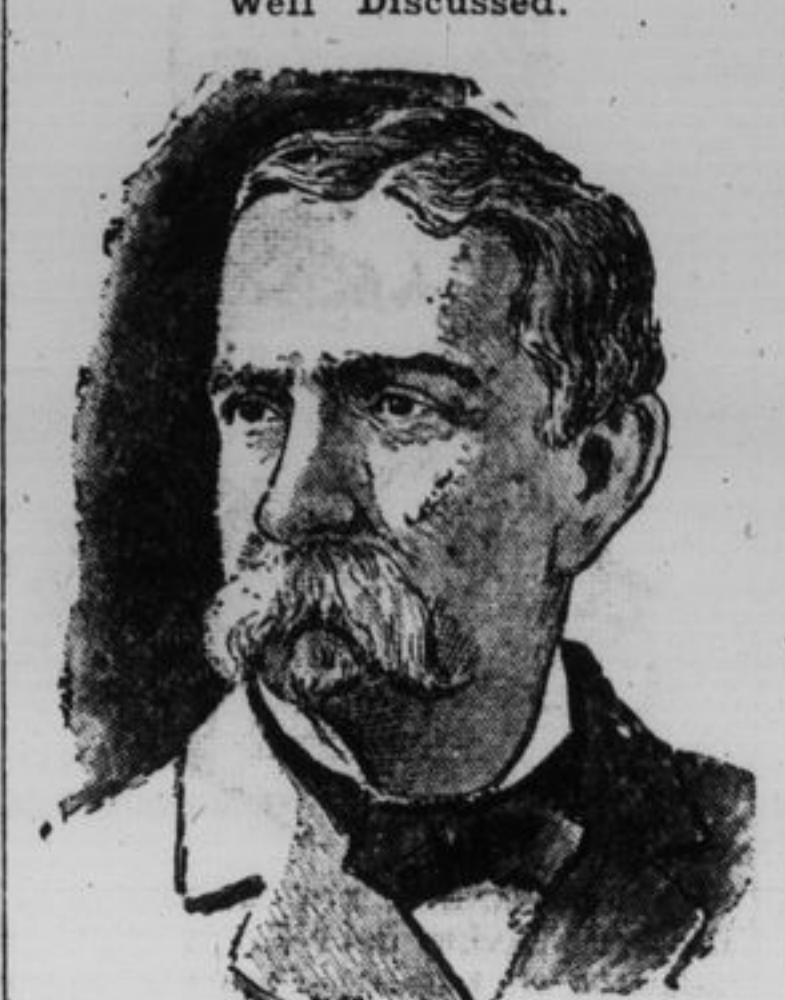
