Trees As Forecasts Of Rain.

The Moothly Weather Review. It is true that people often say that the turning up of leaves is a sign rain. I have heard the remark many times, but as far as my observations go the sign does not seem to be; very sure one. There are many kinds of trees, like the silver leaf poplars in fact all poplars, the maple, and some of the oaks, which turn their leaves up whenever there is a fairly strong, steady wind, but they do it as much in clear weather as in rainy.

It has been suggested to me that possibly the belief may have ariser from the fact that winds capable of turning leaves over very often precede or follow rain storms, and as people are usually on the alert when the gen eral atmospheric conditions favor rain, looking for signs to confirm the general feeling they have that it is going to rain, it might be that the turning up of the leaves would be especially noted at such times.

A striking illustration of vicissi tudes is to be found in the list those lately accepting hospitality from the Guardians of West Ham Union, England, which included the name of Sir William Gordon Macgregor, Bart For some time Sir William has been a familiar figure in Leyton and Walthamstow. He suffers from partial paralysis, which affects his speech as well as his hands. Sir William is the fourth baronet. He is the son of the late Rev. Sir Charles Macgregor, and succeeded his father in 1879. The first holder of the title was Sergeant-Surgeon to George IV. The motto of the family, which is of common ancestry with the Macgregors of Macgregor, is 'E'en do and spair nocht." Sir Wil liam has a vounger brother, Col. Charles Reginald Macgregor, who took part in the famous march from Cabul to Candahar, being several times mentioned in dispatches in the Afghan and Burmese campaigns.

Sir William is fifty-six, though hi silvered hair and beard made him look older. 
