### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Market News.

Britain last year imported no less than £1,325,000 worth of musical instruments—£750,000 worth from Germany alone.

The Grand Trunk railway system has issued the following statement of earnings: Week ending November 7th, 1902, \$626,467; corresponding week, 1901, \$552,912; increase, \$73,555.

In the Montreal market dressed hogs rule about evenly under a fair looking demand. Sales of fresh killed abattoir stock were made at \$8.50 to \$8.75 and country killed at \$8 per 160 lbs.

Exports of butter and cheese from Montreal to Britain last week were nearly twice as great as during the same week in 1901. Cheese shipments were 106,372 boxes, and butter, 20,814 packages. The total shipments of butter and cheese since May 1st are much in excess of those during the past two years.

According to the Trade Bulletin the visible supply of cheese on both sides of the Atlantic at the present time is estimated at between 200,000 and 300,000 boxes less than at this time last year, and it is generally expected that prices will advance to 60c. very shortly.

The October shipments by the Dominion Coal Company, fell off 18,083 tons from the September record-breaking figures, amounting to 295,864 tons. The Dominion mines made a new high production record, however, in October with an output of 311,400 tons, or 15,536 tons in excess of shipments. The total shipments this year to October 31st, amounted to 2,135,933 tons, with four months ahead to bring its yearly production to the \$3,000,000 ton mark.

According to the United States Investor, gross earnings of forty-one roads for the fourth week of October were \$14,842,378, an increase of \$1,002,900 over last year. Thirty-three roads show increases and eight decreases. Since July 1st these roads earned \$157,658,387, an increase of \$10,957,687. For the longer period thirty-three roads show increases, and eight decreases. For the month of October forty-six roads earned \$54,486,426, an increase of \$3,353,222.

## WAS SET FREE

COURT ROOM RANG WITH CHEERS AT RESULT

Prisoner is Jubilant—Calmly Heard the Verdict which Cleared Him of the Charge of Murdering Mrs. Adams.

New York, Nov. 12.—Roland B. Molineaux was set at liberty yesterday after spending nearly four years in prison and being once condemned to death and twice placed on trial for his life for the murder of Mrs. Katharine J. Adams.

Thirteen minutes sufficed for the jury to reach a verdict of acquittal at the close of a trial that has lasted four weeks, the first trial, which resulted in Molineaux's conviction and sentence, having been prolonged for about three months.

The verdict, confidently anticipated, was greeted with an instantly suppressed outbreak of applause. Justice

Molineaux, who was brought into court as soon as it was known that the jury had agreed, was apparently as unconcerned as he has been throughout the trial and gave no evidence of emotion when the words that established his innocence were pronounced.

His aged father, Gen. Molineaux, was deeply affected and could with difficulty respond to the greetings of friends who pressed forward to offer their congratulations.
