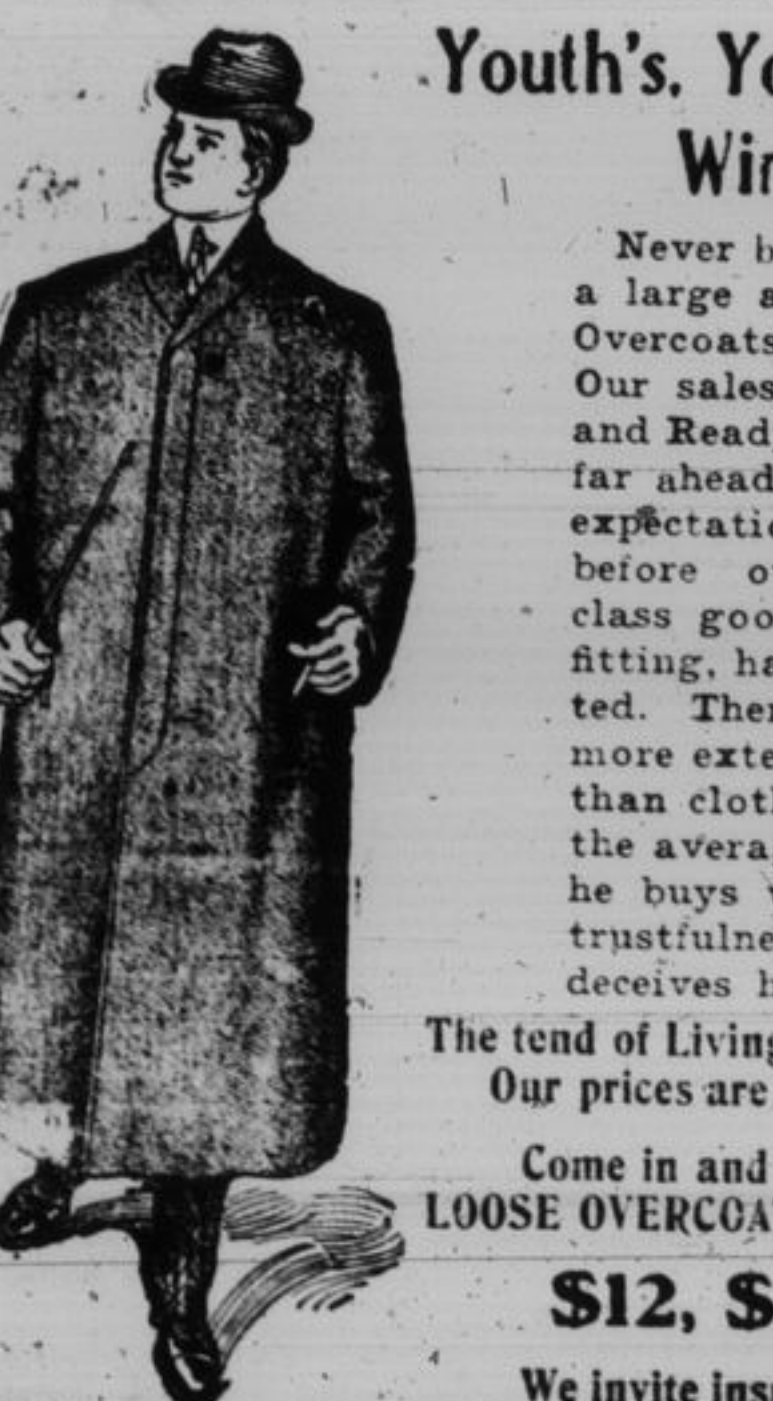

MAY SELECT OTTAWA

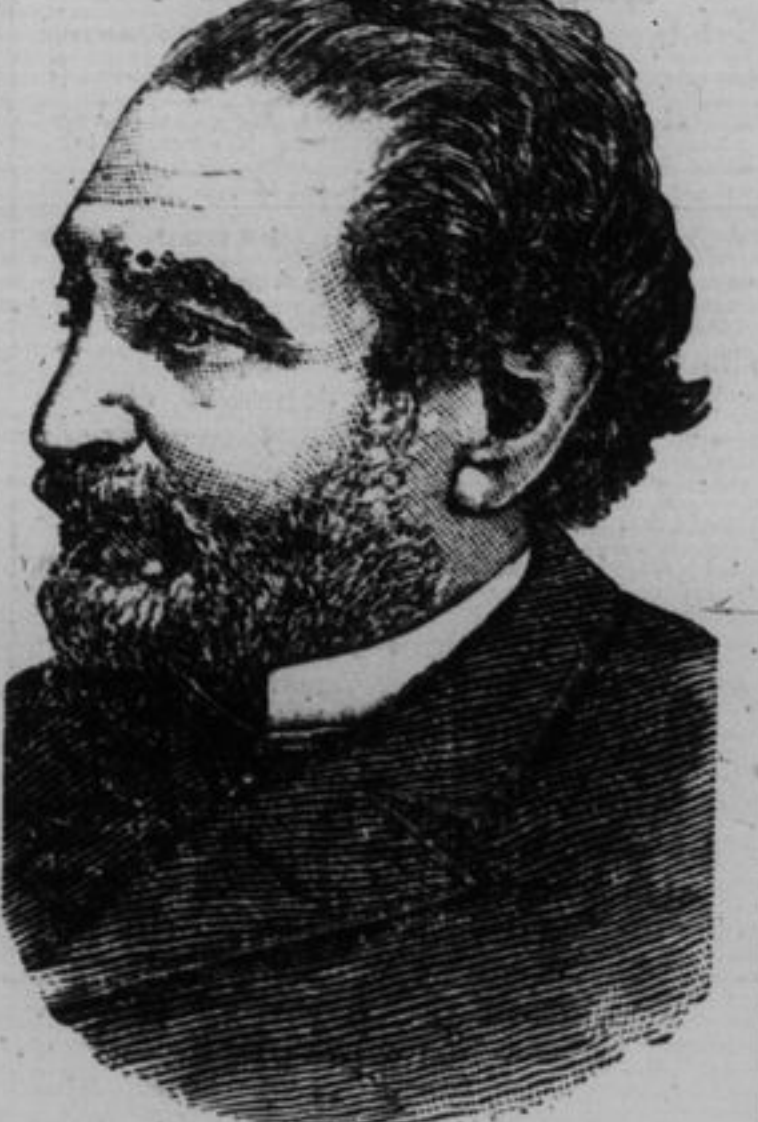
Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Mr. Falconio leaves on the 18th for Toronto, and will go to Washington from there by way of Buffalo. He will receive several addresses before leaving Ottawa.

The rate of expansion revealed by the trade returns of the four months which ended on October 31st, Canada's aggregate foreign commerce will show a gain of not less than \$7,000,000 when the fiscal year closes eight months from now.

The cabinet has decided to let the law take its course in the case of Rose, sentenced to be hanged at Rossland, on the 21st inst. The new steamer Toledo, owned by the Sun Oil company, touched at Port Colborne on Wednesday, en route to Galveston, Texas. Her capacity is 9000 gallons, and her cost, \$250,000.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest News Culled From All Over The World.

C. M. Bowman, M.P.P., likely to be chosen by liberals as the whip in the Ontario legislature.

American capitalists are after three million acres of land in New Ontario for colonization scheme.

The estimates for the University of Toronto, as adopted by the government, show a deficit of over \$18,000.

Miss Louise Hoge, Evanston, Ill., is dead as a result of Christian Science treatment, and lack of medical attention.

Emperor William, who is pheasant-shooting in the Sandringham preserves is a crack shot, keeping three loaders busy.

The steamer Rosalie, running between Victoria and Seattle, collided on Wednesday night, with a freighter in Victoria Harbor.

Watertown took All-Syracuse into camp, Wednesday afternoon, to the tune of twenty-three to six, before a crowd numbering nearly 4,000 people.

Veterans have decided to open a bureau of information regarding the location of land in New Ontario under the grants from the Ontario government.

With a garden hose in his teeth, Mayor-elect George Sullivan, of Derby, Conn., sealed the veranda of Mrs. Mary Walk's home on Wednesday, and put out a fire.

Negotiations for establishment of steamship service between Canada and France are not progressing rapidly, as the annual subsidy of £10,000 promised by M. Delcasse to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, has not yet been granted.

Nina J. Danforth, was sentenced to nine months in the Cambridge, Mass., House of Correction for shooting and killing Andrew J. Emery, who proposed to her, but whom she afterwards found was a married man.

Howard Sler, aged thirteen, who fell under a coal train at Mahoney City, Pa., had both legs cut off close to the body, and died half an hour later, begging his father's forgiveness for disobedience in going on the track.

The Times-Vienna correspondent says that while German Austrians are disappointed at Britain's attitude to Emperor William, it will do Germany no harm to be left out in the cold, as she is always more accommodating after being snubbed.

C. H. Bevington, for about six years with the Grand Trunk R.R. in various capacities, and more recently superintendent of the Rutland, has been appointed superintendent of the Pittsburg, Shawmut & Northern railway of Pennsylvania.

The Trevitt and Mattis Bank of Champaign, was swindled out of \$2,500, by a clever land deal this week.

Inspired by a desire to emulate border outlaws, as they appear in dime novels, Earl Nixon, aged seventeen, shot, and perhaps fatally wounded Edward Kille, of South Bend, Ind.

Reports from Skagway say the Yukon is frozen solid, the steamer Lafrance being caught in ice near Minto. Five hundred pounds mail which left Dawson, October 28th, in a canoe, has been lost, the canoe being caught in ice and crushed near Forty Mile the carrier narrowly escaping.

Hugie Bourquin, head of old Huguenot family, and owner of large estates, was assassinated last week. An escaped convict, who was arrested on suspicion, when put under hypnotic influence, said he had not fired the shots, but knew who had done so. As a consequence four men are under surveillance.

Mrs. J. Pierpont Morgan will bear the expense of the operation on Louis Gardner, a Milwaukee gymnast, whose spine was hurt in falling from a horizontal bar in London last year. Two years ago Gardner stopped a runaway team attached to the Morgan carriage in which was a boy of six. He received reward at the time, but Mrs. Morgan, who saw the brave deed, determined to bribe him if need arose.

Died At Brantford. Brantford, Ont., Nov. 13.—D. M. Lambert, manager of the Bailey Outfitters Co. of this place, died, last night, of typhoid fever. Mr. Lambert was well known among bicycle manufacturers throughout the dominion, having been at one time manager of a company here which manufactured wooden tires for bicycles. He leaves a widow and one child.

TERRIBLE FATE.

BOY DIES FROM EXPOSURE IN OPEN BOAT.

Two Comrades Nearly Dead—Knew Very Little That Happened During the Long Hours Until Morning.

Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 13.—Monday morning Claude Stewart, a lad was sent to a store to pay a bill by his mother, who gave him \$2. Instead of doing this he got his brother, Ernie, and Harold Marcey, and after buying some candy they went to the Beach to have a good time. In the afternoon they took a rowboat, which had been pulled up on the shore, and started for home. There was a heavy sea running, and they soon got chilled through, and unable to row any longer...

When the police arrived at the smelting works they discovered them of their clothing, wrapped them in warm blankets, and without any loss of time, removed them to the City Hospital, where Dr. Glasco is attending them.

SCARES THEM INTO BAPTISM.

Great Fire in a Chinese City Has a Curious Sequel.

Victoria, B.C., Nov. 13.—Mail advices from China report a fire at Kweilin, Kwangsi, causing great loss of life and property. The fire originated in a fire-cracker shop where the men were testing the powder. An explosion followed and then a fire, which spread and burned several hundred houses. Many Chinese were burned to death.

The fire burned houses all around the Christian Alliance mission, which was unscathed. The result of this freak of the fire is that many Chinese have since come to the mission to be baptized.

Grand Trunk May Buy It.

Montreal, Nov. 13.—Hon. Mr. Tarte writes as follows in La Patrie: "I am in a position to say that the Grand Trunk is looking to the purchase of the Mackenzie & Mann railway system. Senator Cox, James Ross and other capitalists are acting in concert with the Grand Trunk in this matter."

An Exciting Time.

Paris, Nov. 13.—Intense excitement was caused in the chamber of Deputies, to-day, by the firing of a pistol in the lobby. The members crowded to the scene of the shooting and found that an officer of a colonial regiment had captured his revolver in the air while shouting, "Vive la Patrie." He is believed to be crazy.
