MILITIA ORDERS.

DEPARTMENT ASKS FOR INFORMATION

Hard to Dispose of Empty Cartridge Cases—Course of Instruction in Gymnastics.

Ottawa, Nov. 11.—Militia orders announce that district officers commanding will be asked to submit a return of the number of hot water heating boilers and steam-heating boilers in use in each military building within their commands.

In future units of active militia, and if the associations will, instead of sending empty cartridge cases to militia stores, send them direct to the superintendent of the government arsenal.

A course of instruction of gymnastics for non-commissioned officers of the active militia will commence at the Royal Military College, Canada, on January 15th, 1903.

NEWS OF WORLD

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody

Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered by the Dear Public.

The town of Olyphant, near Scranton, Pa., was swept by fire on Thursday.

Three families in Ermdale township, Pa., and two in Bingham Elgin, have small-pox.

Miss Nancy Kane, committed suicide at Lockport, N.Y., on Wednesday night. She was melancholy over the loss of her parents.

The police have found more evidence that will likely convict young Perry of the murder of Clara A. Morten at Boston, a few days ago.

Theodore Adams, eighty-one years old, is under arrest at Buffalo, charged with the attempted murder of his daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Burley.

United States Senator Mark Hanna denies that he is a sick man. He is devoting much time to personal business and is in his office several hours each day.

John Davis, negro, was hanged in the court yard at Lewisburg, Tenn., on Thursday by a mob of 500 men, in revenge for the murder of Robert Adair, farmer.

A jury at Pittsburg, Pa., have held Charles Cawley, aged sixteen, for the murder of his mother, and his brothers and sisters, five in all. He is stolidly indifferent.

Archbishop Bruchesi of Montreal, is now in Rome, and is regarded as the most probable new Canadian cardinal, to take the place of Cardinal Taschereau, who died in 1898.

Maryland Heights, in Virginia, is alive from the ridge of the mountains to their foot a distance of five miles, with a southern breeze carrying the flames rapidly northward.

Forty persons, who were on board the British steamer, Elmgante, wrecked November 9th, off the coast of New Zealand, are still missing. The ninety survivors had a painful experience.

An unknown burglar's head was blown off at Elletts, Ohio, and the town council marshal was shot through the lips in a fight between citizens and robbers early this morning.

Sir William Macdonald, testifying before the tobacco commission at Montreal, expressed an unfavorable opinion of encouraging tobacco growing in Canada, saying the climate was not suited to it.

A small-pox epidemic is raging at Rochester. Eight patients were received in hospital within twenty-four hours. Voting booths have been temporarily fitted up for accommodation of the patients.

The Central National Bank, Boston, Mass., did not open its doors this morning. The bank has deposits aggregating about \$3,500,000. Excess loans and slow paper are given as causes leading to the failure.

Mrs. Helen Costello, of Buffalo, attempted to commit suicide by jumping into the rapids at Niagara. A reservation employee was lowered from the bridge connecting Green and Goat islands and rescued the woman.

The investigation at Toronto, on the charges against Mr. and Mrs. Raymond, arrested with William Stewart, the counterfeiter, has been enlarged a week. The police are of opinion that Mrs. Raymond's sister assisted in distributing the forged paper.

Stephen U. White, familiarly known in Wall Street, New York, as "Deacon" White, has sold his seat on the New York Stock Exchange for \$80,000. Mr. White said, "I shall confine myself to dealing in securities in the market."

The Sicilian police, who have long been trying to capture the notorious Italian Vatsolone, raided a district of Cammarata on Thursday, taking sixty prisoners, amongst whom were a marquis, a mayor, and several doctors and lawyers.

The formation of another important soft coal combination is in contemplation. Options are held on over 100 properties in Indiana. About \$25,000,000 will be involved in the proposition. The firm will be known as the Indiana Fuel Co.

Admiral Dewey, having command of the combined United States fleets engaged in the Caribbean sea manoeuvres will hoist his flag on the president's yacht, Mayflower, at Washington, December 1st, and sail for the naval base at Culebra Island.

The British Electrical Engineers intend to accept the invitation of the American institution and will send delegates to the International Congress to be held in America in 1901. The British engineers are in favor of holding the congress at Montreal instead of St. Louis.

At the trial of Paul Woodward, of Camden, N.J., charged with poisoning two boys with strychnine, Prof. Marshall, University of Pennsylvania, injected some of the poison into a live frog, which died in writhing agony, thus giving the jury ocular demonstration of the suffocating Woodward's victims endured.

The general coal miners' strike in France, has practically come to an end, although many of the men are still holding out. About two-thirds of the strikers have returned to work. The miners' congress at Lens had voted in favor of resumption of work. Ten thousand strikers, armed with clubs and carrying banners and red flags, made a demonstration at St. Etienne, and a few isolated dynamite outrages are reported from various points in the strike region.
