A Peculiar Case Reported From Buckingham, Que.

Ottawa, Nov. 17 .- A sensational story of supposed suicide is reported from Buckingham last night. At eight o-clock that morning, Antoine Duval, upon entering his stable at Masson found there the body of Thomas Cooke, aged twenty-one, son of Cooke, Buckingham. Lving by hi side was a self-cocking revolver with two empty shells and four bullets in the remaining chambers. A slight examination of the body revealed a bullet wound just below the heart. The coat and vest were unbuttoned, also the upper part of the overcoat. From all accounts the young man had not been drinking.
