ROSEBURY ON HOME RULE.

Some time ago Lord Rosebery was reported to have made a speech in the course of which he declared against home rule for Ireland. Now he is credited with the admission that some development of local power for legislation in domestic affairs, it is essential. This scheme of local government might, he says, be made applicable to England, Ireland and Scotland, and relieve parliament of the business of their purely domestic concerns.

The question is, How far does Lord Rosebery agree with the home rule scheme of the late Mr. Gladstone, or how far does he differ from it? How far is he in harmony with the liberal party upon the subject, or how far is he out of harmony with it? He is the leader of the liberal party in point of ability. His is one of the most influential personalities in England.

They may seem smart talk, but it is reckless and indiscriminate criticism. Letters From Messrs. Mudie and Ferguson.

Kingston, Nov. 19.—(To the Editor.) Upon receiving an invitation from Mr. Ferguson, yesterday, to attend his meeting at the Salvation Army barracks, I considered that a subject of such far reaching consequence to our citizens should be discussed only after due notice of a public meeting. I, therefore, promptly replied to the effect that I thought our meeting should be in a public hall not earlier than Friday evening, and that as he was in favor of bringing the act into force he should speak first for one hour, that I should then speak an hour, and that each of us should have the right to reply. I requested an answer, but I have not received any and I now hear that he commented upon my pamphlet at his meeting last evening.

I spent much thought in trying to frame my pamphlet, according to what I believed to be the truth, and without any reward or hope of reward except the approval of my own conscience, and when attacked by any speaker it is only fair that the electors should hear me defend it, and I am willing to defend it publicly against Mr. Ferguson or any other orator the prohibitionists can produce. PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest News Colled From All Over The World.

In a fire at Glasgow, one man was killed and several injured.

A converted woman, of Hoboken, N. J., tells of anarchistic plots to have President Roosevelt assassinated.

President Mitchell has been on the witness stand for four consecutive days at the strike commission's sessions.

Taylor and Flood, picked from British Columbia, as representatives on the all-Canadian rugby team, to visit England, cannot go.

The strike of the coal miners of the Crow's Nest Coal company, at Mackie, B.C., has been settled. The miners have resumed work.

The Great Eastern, South Eastern, and Brighton railways have given notice they will apply to parliament next year for permission to use electric traction.

The Krupp gun works at Berlin have been considerably affected by the general depression in business. Several departments including the hammer mills, had not been in operation for three successive days.

Angiers, driving a French motor car, covered a kilometer (sixty-two hundredths of a mile) in twenty-nine seconds. This beats Fournier's record made on November 6th, by one-fifth of a second. It represents a speed of seventy-seven miles per hour.

The Clay Workers' Association of Ontario was organized at London, Ont., on Tuesday, with a membership of between thirty and forty. The object is declared to be simply a general betterment of the lot of the workers.

In consequence of the attack on his policy in regard to the Franco-Siamese treaty, M. Delcasse, the French minister of foreign affairs, has decided to retard the debate on the treaty and in the meantime to negotiate for further concessions at Bangkok.

At London, Chase, bicyclist, riding a motor bicycle, covered 228 miles and five yards in six hours, establishing a record. Incidentally he made a record for a hundred miles, covering that distance in two hours, twenty-seven minutes and thirty-five seconds.

Varsity hopes to have the Burnside rules vet adopted by the Intercollegiate football union. It is proposed to have representation in Toronto, next Saturday, from Queen's and McGill for the Varsity. Arrangements made.

Germany denies intention to establish a permanent naval station near the American coast. The squadron now in Central and South American waters fitted out to protect Germany's legal rights, will not be permanently stationed near the Atlantic coast.
