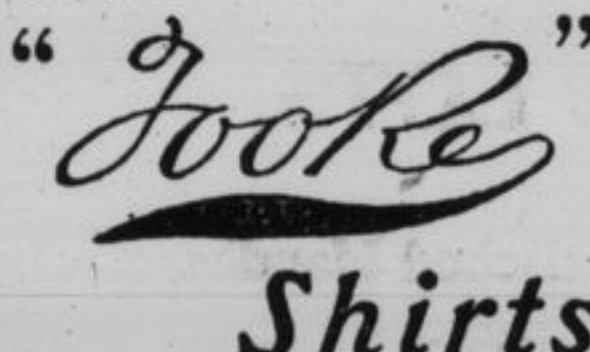

A NEW ROUTE

To Have Another Transcontinental Line.

SURVEYORS OUT

TO LOCATE AN EXTENSION TO WHITE RIVER.

There the Line Will Join the Algoma Central - The Grand Trunk Has a Franchise and May Operate it at an Early Date.

Toronto, Nov. 21.—The Globe today states that the Canadian Northern railway company just sent out two surveying parties from Fort William to locate a route from there to White River, where proposed extension, easterly from Fort William, will meet the Algoma Central. This route is intended to run considerably farther north than the Canadian Pacific road, which skirts the lake shore. The Algoma Central railway running north from the Soo is completed to within twenty-five miles of White River. The Globe also says that a well-defined rumor is that the G. T. R. have secured a franchise which will enable them to reach the Soo from the west and on to Sudbury, or join the Algoma Central whose Manitoulin and North Shore road may run north to Sudbury after leaving Manitoulin, and before turning west to the Soo.

Ten cases of small-pox are reported to-day from Torbolton, Carleton county. Six clauses of further particulars, charging payment of money for votes and the giving of railway tickets were filed, this morning, in the South Oxford election petition, trial of which has already been partly disposed of and will be reopened on December 1st at Woodstock.

Joseph Gentile was found guilty this morning, in the police court, of two charges, first of uttering Canadian counterfeit coins and second of uttering United States counterfeit coins. On the first he was sentenced to ten years, and on the second to three years imprisonment, the sentences to run concurrently.

Concert in Portsmouth.

A pleasing entertainment was conducted last night by the congregation of St. John's church, Portsmouth, in the Sunday school room. The large attendance testified highly to the ability of the congregation to present an attractive programme. Solos were rendered by Mrs. Birkett, Miss Bates, J. B. Mr. Henstridge read a statement of affairs of the church, showing the finances to be in an excellent condition. Rev. J. O. Crisp made an efficient chairman.

FINEST OF THE SEASON.

Verdict of Audience Who Witnessed The "Show Girl."

Three hours of mingled hilarity and delightful melody, with an entrancing display of women, tells in brief the story of Edward E. Rice's production, "The Show Girl," at the Grand opera house last evening. There is not any discernible plot in the play, but there is a pleasant concord of exquisite color blending, fascinating music, rhythmic dancing, delightful fun and revelry of all sorts, "The Show Girl" is not a comic opera, nor a musical comedy, nor anything at all in particular. Its proper title could not be found in any glossary of theatrical terms. A "jolly bit of tomfoolery," the programme calls it, and the programme is just about right.

But it is tomfoolery that is never loud, never vulgar, never repellent; just the jolliest kind of tomfoolery all the way through. There are comedians who are genuinely funny and chorus girls who are genuinely pretty; songs that have some point to them and music that rings pleasantly in the ear long after one has heard it, striking effective costumes, stage pictures that always please the eye, and smatches of burlesque that one can't help laughing at.

Among the best of the features was the remarkable animal act of David Abraham, who made a most realistic cat and created uproarious fun with his antics. It is probably the best performance of the kind ever seen in Kingston. Another big number was the acrobatic dancing of the Three Rosebuds, and another was the unique act entitled "Learning to Dance by Book," contributed by Frank C. Young and Bessie De Voie. Anna McNabb and Neil McNeil, gave a "Bowery Tough and Bowery Gay" act that fairly electrified the audience.

Mr. Lalor's "Spotless Town" had a similar experience. Robert L. Dailey, Miss Yolande Wallace and chorus scored a big hit with the coon song and dance, "Susie-Anna-Anna," and the military march of the cadets at the close of the second act, to the accompaniment of the soldier's love song, sung by David Lythgoe, was a spirited and highly successful number. "Karinna," sung by Kathryn Hutchinson and danced by Paul Chute, scored heavily, as was to be expected.

Especially taking proved "That's the Way of a Sailor," "As the Prince Waked the Princess," "Psyche," "Reggie's Family Tree," and "The One That He Loves Best."

Frank Lalor, as Dionysius Fly, and Robert L. Dailey, as Garrick Forrest Macerney, filled the roles to overflowing. They were the life of the piece on its humorous side, and their work needs no extended comment. They were closely and most ably assisted in the fun making by Marie Hilton as Vivien Epps, Yolande Wallace as Lady Clarissa, and Bessie De Voie as Lady Lettie Fringle.

Kathryn Hutchinson was the Miss Cecilia Gay. Miss Hutchinson made a "somewhat rise from the chorus to this leading role, but fills her place admirably, as she is young and pretty, a tall, fair-like blonde, winsome always and an excellent singer, good reader and actress. David Lythgoe is the Capt. E. Ross Armor, and sang and acted to the great acceptance. He is a manly looking young fellow, and kept his character well in hand throughout. The Jhonnie Cadeys of Neil McNeil, and the Lord Cadwallader Dyce of Frank C. Young were in excellent keeping. The four Rainbow sisters were as charming.

Many others in the big company and other features deserve mention in space permit. The whole show, in a sentence, is huge, lively and intensely and pleasantly diverting.

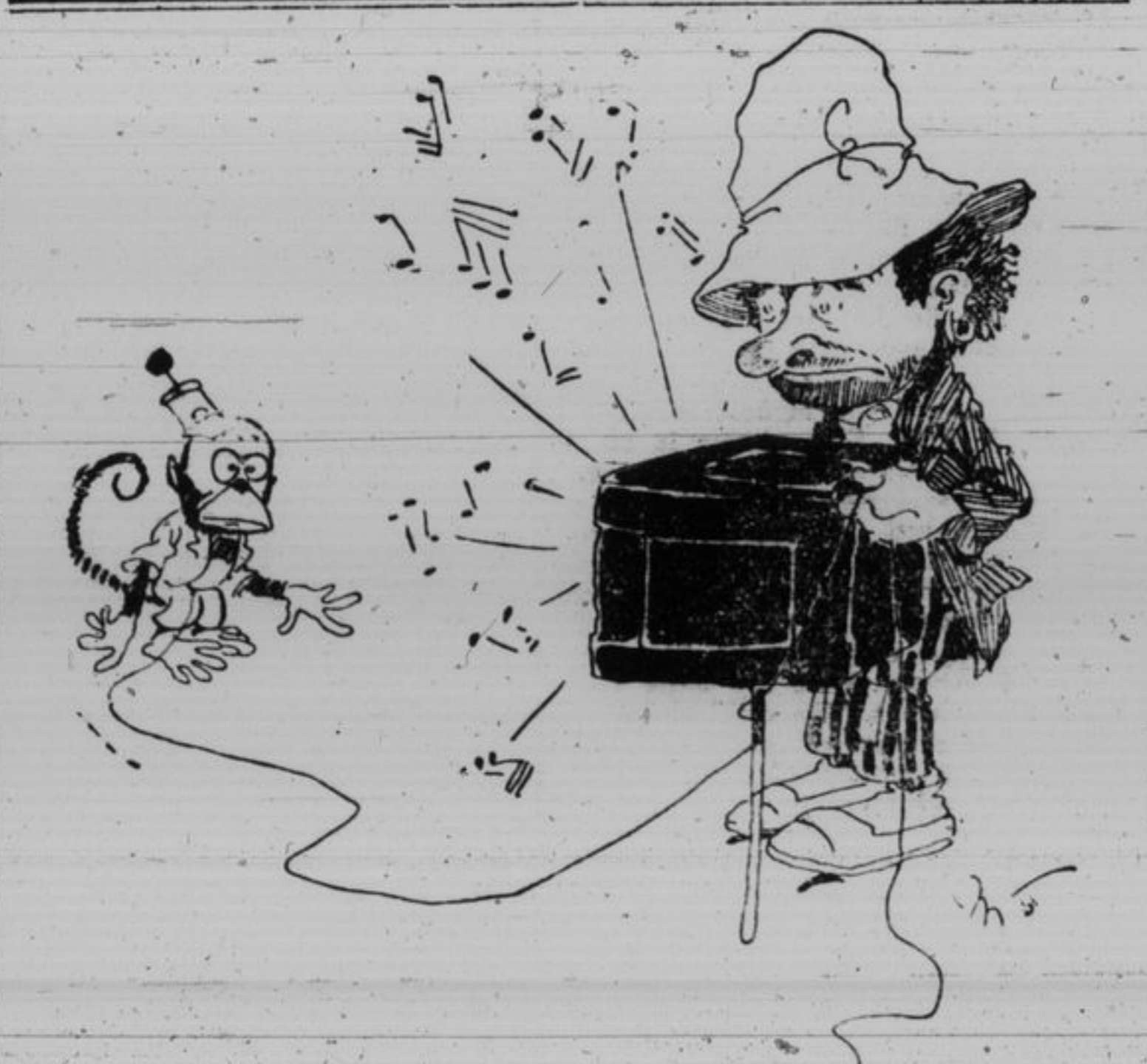
