NAMED PRIOR

AS SUCCESSOR TO PREMIER DUNSMUIR

He Was Sworn in as Premier and Minister of Mines—His Cabinet Remains Practically Unchanged.

Victoria, B.C., Nov. 22.—Premier Dunsmuir, yesterday, handed in his resignation to the governor and recommended Hon. E. G. Prior as his successor. Col. Prior was sent for and had a conference, as the result of which the former was sworn-in last evening as premier and minister of mines. The composition of the cabinet will remain practically unchanged. The resignation of Mr. Dunsmuir had been pending for some time.

Women Doctors in Paris. A statistician has discovered that Paris has now fifty-seven women doctors out of a total of 3,000 practitioners. AGRICULTURE.

A COLUMN OF NOTES FOR THE FARMERS.

An Active Campaign Needed Against the San Jose Scale—The Best Selling Horses—Soil Suited to Wheat Raising.

Cream should be kept cool until a short time, twelve hours or so, before churning, when, if necessary, it should be warmed up to about seventy degrees to facilitate its proper ripening.

Insect pests on strawberries are so numerous now that it is generally regarded to be better and easier to set a new bed than to try to kill the insects. Ploughing up the old bed in August will destroy most of them.

Hon. John Dryden, provincial minister of agriculture, says: "I have no doubt that if an active campaign is instituted, the San Jose scale can be eradicated altogether."

It is the conclusion of fruit men that apples keep much better if they are hurried into cold storage as promptly as they are picked, instead of being left in the orchard in piles or in barrels to sweat.

According to the Missouri Agricultural station, the best form of farm wagon is one with axles of equal length, broad tires and wheels thirty to thirty-six inches high in front and forty to forty-four inches behind.

The best selling horses to-day are heavy draughts, carriage horses and saddle horses. The Clydes are a good draught breed, and seem to be most in demand. The Standards claim that their stallion will get good carriage horses.

Fully \$60,000 has, according to William Rickard, M.P.P., been received by the farmers of West Durham for apples this season.

The American Agriculturist says that one bushel of carrots, if properly fed to horses, is worth a peck of oats.

Michigan growers will lose between one and two million dollars by the failure of the bean crop.

On the truck farms within a few miles of New York more than 3,000 women farmers and farm hands are employed.

The Beaverton, Ont., plant is making enough peat for the use of the town, and a surplus besides. Methods are now available under which peat can be prepared for use as fuel at a cost of \$1.50 a ton.

To relieve young turkeys of lice, hang the birds up and grease them thoroughly with lard or kerosene.

The soil in the vicinity of Qu'Appelle, Man., is well suited for wheat raising. Richard Johnston, a farmer there, says he took 8,500 bushels from a field of 105 acres with one ploughing. Of this amount the crop last year was 5,600 bushels. For this year's crop he simply sowed the wheat in the stubble. The yield, of course, was not so heavy, but he got 3,000 bushels.

Manitoba flour ranks first. A special test was recently made in Ottawa with nine barrels of flour from Manitoba, Washington territory and Oregon. The Manitoba flour produced twenty-one pounds more of bread than the others.

The Canadian North West Land company sold during October 38,000 acres of land for \$208,000, which compares with 19,218 acres for \$100,751 during October of last year, and the total number of acres disposed of during the first ten months of the year was 162,000 for \$2,202,000, as compared with 85,153 for \$155,311 during the corresponding months of 1901.

The department of agriculture reports that the Hessian fly has almost disappeared. The pea weevil did considerable damage this year.

Potato rot caused much damage this year. In some sections of the province they will be left in the ground. The yield will be small in consequence.

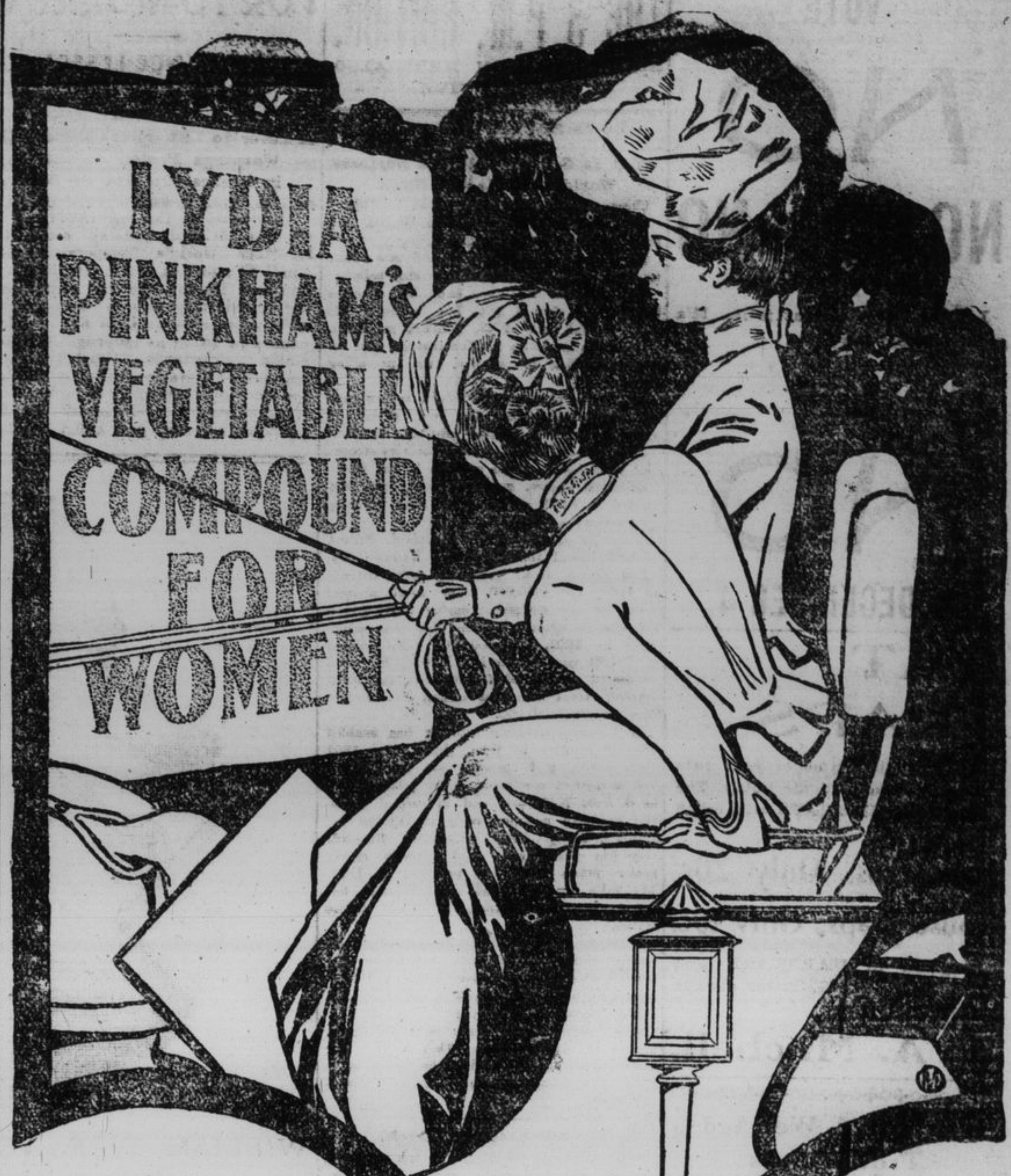
The London, Eng., Telegraph says Canada is a highly progressive land, and that the department of agriculture is an energetic one, in that it has shown the dairymen and farmers the way to prevent butter from moulding by wrapping it in paper soaked in a solution of formalin to a gallon of brine. This fact will be worth many thousands of dollars a year to our butter trade.

The total number of apple trees of bearing age in the commercial orchard areas of the United States is 210,000,000, an increase of 75,000,000 in ten years.

The English publication, Engineering, says: "The only country we can look to for the timber we must have is Canada." There are only five European countries which export timber—Russia, Sweden, Austria-Hungary, Norway and Roumania—and their exports are nearly 2,750,000 tons short of the total amount required in Europe.

EUROPE'S MILITARY BURDENS
France Bears Heaviest and Russia Lightest.

With a population of 57,000,000 inhabitants, Germany now furnishes an annual contingent of 540,000 soldiers, which must be reduced to 413,000, after deducting the exempt from service, according to the latest figures given in an article in "The Courier des Etats Unis." A considerable share of these 413,000 men are immediately incorporated either in the land army or in the recruiting reserve, however, so that the number of men really incorporated in the regular army is only 220,000. But this number is sufficient to bring up the present effective force to 495,000. The men serve with the colors only the required time to gain instruction. The length of service in the line is two years for the infantry, three years in the cavalry and one year in the train.

In Russia, where compulsory service has been in existence for the last thirty years, the men are obliged to serve five years in the regular army, thirteen years in the reserve and five years in the Territorial, which is the same as the reserve of the French territorial army. With a population of 132,000,000 Russia furnishes annually 650,000 conscripts, of whom about 89,000 are good for service. Under these circumstances the government can well afford to be generous in the matter of exemptions. Their number amounts to 100,000, so that the real number of men in the regular service was 308,000 in 1891 and 318,000 in 1902.

In Austria the annual contingent is 470,000, but exemptions reduce it to 417,000. The length of the regular service is two and a half years. In Italy, where the annual contingent is 315,000 only 295,000 are found to be good for service, which varies from two and a half to three years. As to
