Fruit—Jamaica oranges, 20c. to 40c. a dozen; apples, 15c. to 25c. a peck or \$1 to \$2 a barrel; lemons 20c. dozen; bananas, 25c. dozen; cranberries, 12c. a quart.

Vegetables—Potatoes, 75c. to 90c. a bag; cabbage, 5c. a head; carrots, and beets, 40c. a bushel; onions, 60c. to 70c. a bag.

The "Moon's" view of the Doukhobor situation is that they are bored. They are, in fact, too monotonously safe. One of Marion Harland's most popular recipes is for "devil's cake," which is made as follows: Boil together half a cup of grated chocolate, half a cup of sweet milk, half a cup of brown sugar. Boil these ingredients together until thick as cream and let cool. One cup of brown sugar, half a cup of butter, two eggs, beaten; two-thirds of a cup of milk, vanilla flavoring. Mix well, beat in the boiled mixture, and two cups of flour, sifted together with baking powder.

Trim the crust from five slices of bread and fry to a light brown in butter; sprinkle with powdered sugar, place on a platter and cover an inch deep with hot, well-seasoned apple sauce, if you want to make the new dish; apple toast.
