NIGHT PROWLER CALLED "JACK THE CLIPPER."

Panic Reigns in the Town—Miss Nellie Goudry Attacked When About to Enter Her Home and Loses One of Her Long Braids of Hair.

Fultonville, N.Y., Nov. 26.—The women of this town are in a state of panic through fear of a night prowler, to whom has been given the name of "Jack the Clipper."

He first appeared a few nights ago, when he attacked Miss Nellie Goudry as she was about to enter her home, and clipped off one of her long braids of hair. On Monday night he seized Mrs. Floyd Wormuth, and after gagging her, he cut off her hair and exclaiming "You are not the one!" released her and fled.

Women refuse to venture out at night unescorted, and the men of the town are organizing to capture the prowler.
