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## ANGLICANS DO FAVOR PROHIBITION, SAYS THIS WRITER

Librarian Hale States That Mr. Mudie Was Misinformed—Roman Catholics and Anglicans Opposed to the Liquor Traffic.

Orillia, Nov. 24.—(To the Editor): I read in this day's Toronto Globe that in debating the liquor act of 1902, John Mudie, K.C., claimed that the Roman Catholics and Anglicans stand aloof from attacks upon the liquor traffic. As this imputation will be regarded as a slur upon those churches by a large number, both within and without their communion, I beg to ask space to say that Mr. Mudie is singularly ill-informed as to the attitude of a large portion, at least, of the people he assumed to speak for.

The Church of Ireland Temperance Society certainly is no friend of the traffic, and it is claimed to be the largest temperance association, in proportion to the population, among whom it labors, in the world. It includes among its active workers, archbishops, bishops and laymen of every degree. The Church of England has a society whose fortieth annual report is a volume of one hundred and thirty pages, and I fear Mr. Mudie would not regard its periodicals or other publications as "aloof from attacks" upon the trade.

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in prison, besides a cancelling of the druggist's license for three years. Anyone can enter a complaint (and his name must be withheld) against those breaking the law, and the accused must themselves prove they are innocent else they will be held guilty. Witnesses are forced to reply to questions regarding this matter. Inspectors are provided for each district; but complaints may be laid before a county judge, magistrate or justice of the peace. And these complaints must be investigated and prosecuted by the attorney-general.

Breweries and distilleries that have licenses from the Dominion government to make liquors for export, may neither sell or allow such liquors to be consumed in distillery or brewery. To sum up, no person shall use or consume liquor in the province purchased or received from any person within the province, except it be purchased from a license.

If such a law does not prohibit it, it is no good, as some claim, I'd like them to explain its defects, and to show what kind of a law will prohibit. Some say the Duncan act, and Scott act did no good and this will do no good. Let us examine the facts. Before the agitation for the Duncan act, and Scott act, previous to 1879, there were, according to Mr. Ross' statement:

In 1875—1,793 tavern licenses, 1,307 shop licenses, fifty-two wholesale licenses and thirty-three vessel licenses. In 1901, last year—2,621 tavern licenses, 308 shop licenses, twenty-one wholesale and no vessel licenses.

The total number of licenses in 1875 was 6,185, and total number in 1901 was 2,950.

In view of these facts will anyone say that the agitation and efforts to bring about even local measures of prohibition did no good? Or will anyone presume to say these licenses would have been lessened to the extent they have, had there been no agitation for prohibition in the last thirty years?
