A GREAT CRIME

HEAVY CURSES FOR ONCE TRUSTED MAN

He Wrecked a Building Society in Which People Had Faith—A Great Wrong Has Been Committed.

Millville, N.J., Nov. 28.—Over this ugly little town, one of the group of bustling thriving places lining South Jersey, hangs the shadow of a great crime and a great wrong. Homelessness and starvation await old men and women as a reward for their trust in the famous Stock Building and Loan Association, which for more than twenty-five years had stood as the synonym of all that was stable in financial investment. The air is heavy with curses on the name of Richard Howell.

The story unearthed brings to light that from the first day of Mr. Howell's twenty-eight years of service as secretary until the moment when last Wednesday he turned to wave a smiling good-bye to his friends as he stood on the platform of the Philadelphia express, not the slightest real effort had been made to supervise his management of the books or the transactions in the acceptance of mortgages.

The investigation now proceeding by a board of new auditors reveal a very simple method of operation. With each payment of a loan with interest Howell cancelled the mortgage, returning the deeds to the borrower, and entering satisfaction of claims in the court records. But in the books the loan still appeared as an unsatisfied claim. Howell presumably pocketed the money. In order, however, to cover his fraud, Howell was compelled to pay interest on the now phantom loans in the first years of his operations. When his defalcations were still at a comparatively low figure, this was easy, but the defalcations gradually increasing in sums of \$500 and \$500 at a bound rendered the payment of the accumulated interest more difficult.

In the meantime five large lions, with mouth open and tongues sticking out, had under the guidance of Weedon, the trainer, been driven into the arena. When the band started to play the wedding march the animals growled. The bride and bridegroom, who were at the entrance to the cage, paused when they heard the roars.

Beulah, a long-tailed lion, who was evidently a stranger to wedding ceremonies, crouched for a spring at the bridegroom, but was driven back. The other lion guests began to eat the savdust from the floor. When a flash-light picture was taken and an explosion occurred, a scream, which came from the arena, resounded all through the garden. FAVORED PROHIBITION.

An Address by Rev. Mr. Craig at Kepler.

Kepler, Nov. 27.—Rev. Mr. Craig, Cataract, delivered an excellent address in favor of prohibition in the church here on November 26th. Speaking of the license system he pointed out that it had been fostered and protected by law, and had created a special class, having privileges from which others were excluded. From a financial view he showed that the receipts from the liquor trade to the government were five hundred and fifty thousand dollars per annum, while the liquor trade received from the people eighteen million dollars per year. He quoted from Gladstone that "drink is more deadly than the three great scourges, war, pestilence, and famine." In thirty-two months of war in South Africa 2,942 men were slain by bullets and disease, while in the same time over 300,000 were "slain by the drachm bullet." He pointed out that "the license law has been making for unrighteousness," and undoing the influence of home teaching on the child, and further that some men of the very worst character were given licenses.

Under the present system the hotel-keepers had boasted that they knew when the inspector was starting on his rounds, and the law cannot be enforced. He was satisfied that the new law could be enforced and would like to be appointed inspector under the liquor act of 1902.

Speaking on the question of re-appointing hotel-keepers, he pointed out that a property in Cataract sold a few years ago for \$12,000, and immediately after receiving some repairs and obtaining a license it rose in value to \$3,000, while the property just beside it, which formerly sold for \$12,000, sold last year for \$300. The government was under no obligation to re-appoint license holders as their licenses expire yearly on the last day of May. He quoted precedent for this contention.

He showed that as citizens of Ontario we had thus far been forced to acquiesce in the traffic, but now the voters were given an opportunity to dissolve themselves from it, and he trusted all thoughtful men would do all in their power in favor of the bill.

Who Put Money Up.

Hamilton Times.
Dr. Snider told us that he received \$500 for North Norfolk from the provincial conservative campaign fund at Toronto at the May election, and Mr. Carscall testified that he got \$500 from Mr. Bristol at Toronto for Lennox. If all the candidates got \$500 each from the central fund, that would take \$15,000. As it is generally understood that \$100,000 was the amount of the fund, some of the conservative candidates must have got a good deal more than the other fellows.

Plan Religious Awakening.

New York, Nov. 29.—Arrangements have been perfected for the creation of a great religious awakening throughout the Episcopal churches hereabouts by the holding of a series of missionary meetings in the various churches in the first week of Advent, beginning to-morrow. For the diocese of New York Bishop Potter has issued a brief pastoral letter, in which he makes a personal request that the churches shall, so far as possible, arrange their engagements for the week so they may be able to attend the meetings.

Tough On the King.

Madrid, Nov. 28.—Senor Maichon, the distinguished anthropologist, has raised a pronounced sensation in society by the publication, in the Catalonian Medical Review, of an examination from a medical point of King Alfonso's public and private acts and family precedents. Maichon gives a so-called analysis of the king's character along physiological lines and concludes with the inference that the monarch presents a veritable degenerate type. The judicial authorities threaten to sue both the editor of the Review and the writer of the article.

Comet To Pass Near Mercury.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 29.—Calculations made at the Harvard observatory show that the comet B. 1902, this evening will pass within 1,644,000,000 miles of Mercury. Effects of the disturbance upon the planet can, therefore, be determined so accurately that a good value of the mass may be obtained. It is expected the comet will be visible after passing its perihelion.

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DIVORCE CASES.

Topeka Has the Record for the Present Year.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 25.—During the ten months ending November 1st, there were filed in the Topeka District court 180 suits for divorce. During the same period the Probate court issued 561 marriage licenses. These records show that about a third of the marriages in Topeka are failures.

The Ministerial Union will start an investigation to ascertain if this condition exists throughout the state. Of the 180 applications for divorce, 144 were granted, and only two were denied. Nineteen cases were dismissed by plaintiffs, and fifty-five cases are pending. Of the 180 applicants for divorce, 133 were women.

Abandonment is the stock charge. Of the cases heard, defence was made in only eighteen, showing that either separation was agreed upon in advance or the defendant was willing that the plaintiff should have freedom.

Ninety-four couples in the divorce suits had been married less than five years, twenty less than one year, two less than a month, and one couple only three days. Ministers and others, who have made inquiry into the matter say most of these unfortunate marriages are the result of short acquaintance, short courtship and hasty marriage.

Queen's Dainty Fad.

Queen Alexandra's especial fad has been a daintiness in keeping with her personality. It is that of having her pocket money made perfectly clean and bright before she fingers it.
