NEW CITIZENS SIXTY-ONE GERMAN MACHINISTS ARRIVE HERE.

Will Labor in the Kingston Locomotive Works—A Desirable Class of Workmen—Doubling Capacity of the Work—Not Aimed at Strikers.

On Sunday at noon Kingston received a desirable addition to her population, the increase being made up of sixty-one machinists, brought out by Cornelius Bermingham, manager director, to work in the Locomotive Works. The new arrivals are made up of fifty-nine Germans and two Englishmen.

Mr. Bermingham left here on October 23rd, sailing from New York on the 26th. He went direct to Germany via England, and made his way to Dusseldorf, near Cologne, a city of upwards of 200,000 inhabitants.

"I went direct to Dusseldorf, which is the centre of the iron manufacturing industry in Germany. In that city and immediate vicinity there are fully 3,000 idle, skilled mechanics.

"I might add that in Germany it is customary for mechanics to secure testimonials from all employers, beginning with the one with whom they served their apprenticeship. Upon entering a new position, these testimonials are surrendered, and returned upon leaving. In this way a mechanic's career is followed closely. Well, I have in my possession the highest testimonials concerning these men. They are the cream of the 1,300 or more who were personally applied for engagement."

"I want to add, that these men have not been brought here because of the late strike, they have not come to take the place of anybody, but have been brought to Kingston because of a determination of the management to increase the output of the works. This could be done in two ways. To either increase the capacity of the machinery, by adding additional machines, or by doubling the number of workmen."

"Some of these men brought their wives and families with them; others who have wives and families are to bring them out as soon as they become settled here. The men are divided around among hotels and boarding houses for the time being. We have guaranteed them a two years' contract, and they are perfectly satisfied."

"We had a little stormy weather coming out, having sailed from Liverpool on the steamship Tunisian on November 20th. We were carried from Halifax to Montreal on the steamship special, and from Montreal we came through to Kingston on a P.R.E. special, via Sharbot Lake. Yes, we have secured a superior class of workmen, who will make desirable citizens. Understand this, however, that had the recent strike here not taken place, we would have had to take this means of securing skilled workmen, as the supply in this country is limited."

"It has been asserted in certain quarters that by bringing the Germans here, the Canadian alien labor law has been violated. This is not the case, and only ignorance of the law is responsible for such assertions. The Canadian alien law stipulates that its provisions shall be applied against those countries only which have such a law directed against Canada. Germany has not such a measure."

Faith Has Cured Him.

Woodstock, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Vouden, wife of Rev. Thomas Vouden, the Methodist minister of this city, who recently resigned his connection with the Methodist church and went to Chicago to join Bowie, has received a letter from her husband, in which he says he is greatly improved in health, and is able now to walk eight blocks with ease.

When Mr. Vouden left here several weeks ago, he could hardly walk. He intends to remain in Chicago, having joined the Bowie faith healing church.

Sails On Wednesday.

London, Dec. 1.—Andrew Carnegie, who was to have sailed for the United States a few weeks ago, but was delayed by illness, has booked passage for Wednesday.

FITH OF THE NEWS. The Very Latest News Culled From All Over The World.

Senator Hanna denies the report that he will resign from the U.S. senate. Edward Buisson, on a hunting trip near Gen. Ind., was found dead, and murder is suspected.

Mrs. Hattie Whitton, Dexter, Me., arrested on suspicion of having poisoned her little girl, hanged herself. Benjamin Full, of Chicago, while drunk, shot and killed a woman he suspected of having stolen \$5 from him.

The funeral of Dr. Parker, pastor of the City Temple, London, has been fixed for Thursday next at Hampstead cemetery. Two foolish, engaged young people in Marston, Ind., quarrelled over some trifling affair, and the girl committed suicide by taking morphine.

The Canadian cabinet ministers have been united to attend the reciprocity congress at Detroit and express their views as to its desirability. Pittsburg capitalists have secured incorporation for a company having for its object the improvement of Cape May. The estimated cost is \$11,000,000.

John W. Williams, Philadelphia, and his wife, have been jailed, as a result of an investigation into the death of two of their children, whose lives were insured. Dr. Parkin arrived in Toronto, today, and will leave for the maritime provinces in a week to consult educationists there regarding the Rhodes scholarships.

Brandon, Man., is about threatened with a fuel famine. It is almost impossible to obtain wood in any shape and there is no hard coal. Souris coal being used in wood heaters. Two thousand dollars worth of damage was done to Moredun, Fergus & James' abattoir at Winnipeg, by fire. The smoke house caught fire and the contents were badly damaged.

At the nominations, to-day, for the by-elections for the House of Commons for Montserrat, Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, liberal, and J. A. Labelle, conservative, were named. Charles Albert, of Stroudsburg, who accidentally swallowed a chicken bone, tried to remove it with a can-opener, with almost fatal results, a doctor arriving barely in time to save his life. Mike Palvosky, McKeesport, Pa., wants to sue Mary Rovosky for damages. He proposed to her on Thanksgiving day, but she disappeared before the wedding which was set for Saturday last.

Michael Shields, electrician of Omaha, committed suicide by electrocuting himself last Saturday. His father on his death bed, had said Michael would not live to be thirty, and the thing proved on his son's mind. Mrs. Higgins, and her two daughters, are fighting Mrs. Augusta Young, in the Brooklyn courts, over the will of Mrs. Higgins' father, Gilbert G. Young, who left the bulk of his property to his wife, his daughter getting \$20.

Richard Mansfield is being shadowed by private detectives. While playing in Cleveland two members of his company assaulted the doorkeeper of the opera house, and the stage hands have threatened to revenge themselves on Mansfield. To all his testimony on behalf of Frederick Snyder, in suit for injuries brought against the People's railway company, Dr. Riley, Baltimore, constructed a part of skeleton from bones carried in his pocket to show the jury just how Snyder was hurt.

JAILED HER GENERALS.

Lisbon, Dec. 1.—Three generals were arrested by order of the queen regent for inciting the army to demonstrations against the government. The generals had informed the absent king that the present cabinet must go and Carlos telegraphed his wife to deal with them according to her pleasure. The queen at once arrested their excellencies and means to keep them in jail until they promise to be good. Portugal has not had such an energetic ruler for twenty years.

SKIPPED WITH CASH.

He is Accused of Stealing Much Money. Montreal, Dec. 1.—A warrant has been issued for the arrest of J. A. Couture, C.P.R. agent at St. Scholastique, Que., who is accused of having embezzled \$1,200 belonging to the Dominion-Express company. Couture was given the money to ship to Montreal, in his capacity as agent of the express company, and instead brought it here himself, and changed it into United States currency at Dominion Bank, and left the country. He is now supposed to be in Mexico.

Paying Over The Cash.

London, Dec. 1.—The Morgan payments, in connection with the purchasing of the International Mercantile Marine company, are being carried out to-day, without excitement. The Morgan office are the centre of considerable activity. About 200 shareholders of the White Star line and the Dominion line presented themselves before noon and they were all paid by cheque.

The absorption of the Nickel Corporation by the International Nickel Corporation, an American concern, has been practically completed.

DEATH'S HAND SHIPWRECK MARINERS SAY WHEN END IS NEAR.

On Stormy Sea in Open Boat—Captain and Crew of the American Schooner Pendleton Brothers Suffer Nineteen Hours When Picked up.

New York, Dec. 1.—The Quebec company's steamer Fontabelle, which arrived yesterday from the West Indies, brought eight shipwrecked mariners who were picked up at sea in an open boat on Saturday evening. The shipwrecked men were Capt. W. G. Kneeland and the crew of seven men of the American schooner Pendleton Brothers.

The Pendleton Brothers left New York on November 20th, with a cargo of cement for Mobile. Almost from the start the schooner had bad weather. The vessel strained badly and began to leak. On the previous voyage the schooner had carried a cargo of coal, which choked the pumps. This condition was not discovered until they were brought into use and in consequence the water gained rapidly before they could be cleared.

At ten o'clock on the night of November 28th, the schooner's crew took to their boat and shortly afterward the schooner went to the bottom. After nineteen hours' exposure in an open boat to the cold, wintry weather, nearly exhausted and wet to the skin, the Fontabelle picked them up. The schooner Pendleton Brothers was built at Belfast, Me., in 1899, was of 672 tons net register and was owned by Pendleton Brothers of this city.

A GREAT ORGANIZATION.

What Federation of Labour Has Accomplished.

Harper's Weekly. Some years ago the Knights of Labor numbered one million, but now their membership has fallen below two hundred thousand. The American Federation of Labor is credited at the present with 550,000 members. On more than one occasion this body has averted the paralysis of business which would follow a general strike. At Chicago, in 1894, for instance, when the American railway union demanded a general or sympathetic strike of all mechanics, the executive committee of the American Federation rejected the demand. Again, in 1901, when the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers asked for a sympathetic strike, believing that with such assistance they would be able to coerce the United States Steel Corporation, the American Federation of Labor refused to comply with their request. These facts and figures indicate that, except in a few trades, American labor organizations have hitherto been too weak to dictate terms to their employers; and, secondly, that the dangerous power of ordering a general or sympathetic strike has been sparingly exercised. It is the prudent course pursued by the American Federation of Labor which has led many onlookers to hope, if not to believe, that the United Mine workers will keep the promise made by Mr. Mitchell in their name—the promise to abide for three years by the decision rendered by a majority of the commission of arbitration appointed by President Roosevelt.

BABY STOLEN TWICE.

First by Father in Rochester, Then in Toronto. Rochester, N.Y., Dec. 1.—Two weeks ago Mrs. Evelyn Wright announced that her husband, John Wright, had taken her eighteen-month-old baby girl and fled. It seems he went to Toronto, and while there the baby became seriously ill. Then he wired to Mrs. Wright to come at once and nurse it. She went, and succeeded in restoring the child to health. One day Wright went out, and the wife lost no time in packing up her belongings, and with the baby in her arms, started for Rochester. Attorney Horace McGuire made a motion in special term of supreme court Saturday morning to have the child restored to the father. Justice Nash denied the motion.

TOOK TOO MUCH LAUDANUM.

Death of Young Woman Who Had Toothache. Woodstock, Dec. 1.—The death occurred Saturday under particularly sad circumstances of Miss Verona Sutherland, daughter of William S. Sutherland. Miss Sutherland had been a great sufferer from toothache and was in the habit of using laudanum as an anesthetic. Unfortunately she took an overdose. A physician was immediately called in and all that human aid could administer was done for her, but without result, and the unfortunate young lady succumbed from the effects.

HATCHET FOR ROOSEVELT.

Hudson Bay Weapon Forwarded At His Request. Ottawa, Dec. 1.—Col. Turner, United States consul, received recently, through Secretary Cortelyou, a personal request from President Roosevelt for a Hudson's Bay hatchet. The colonel secured a fine one from Colin Rankin, factor for the Hudson's Bay company at Mattawa, and at once forwarded it to the president. It possesses a peculiar shaped blade, which makes it specially convenient to hang on a belt.

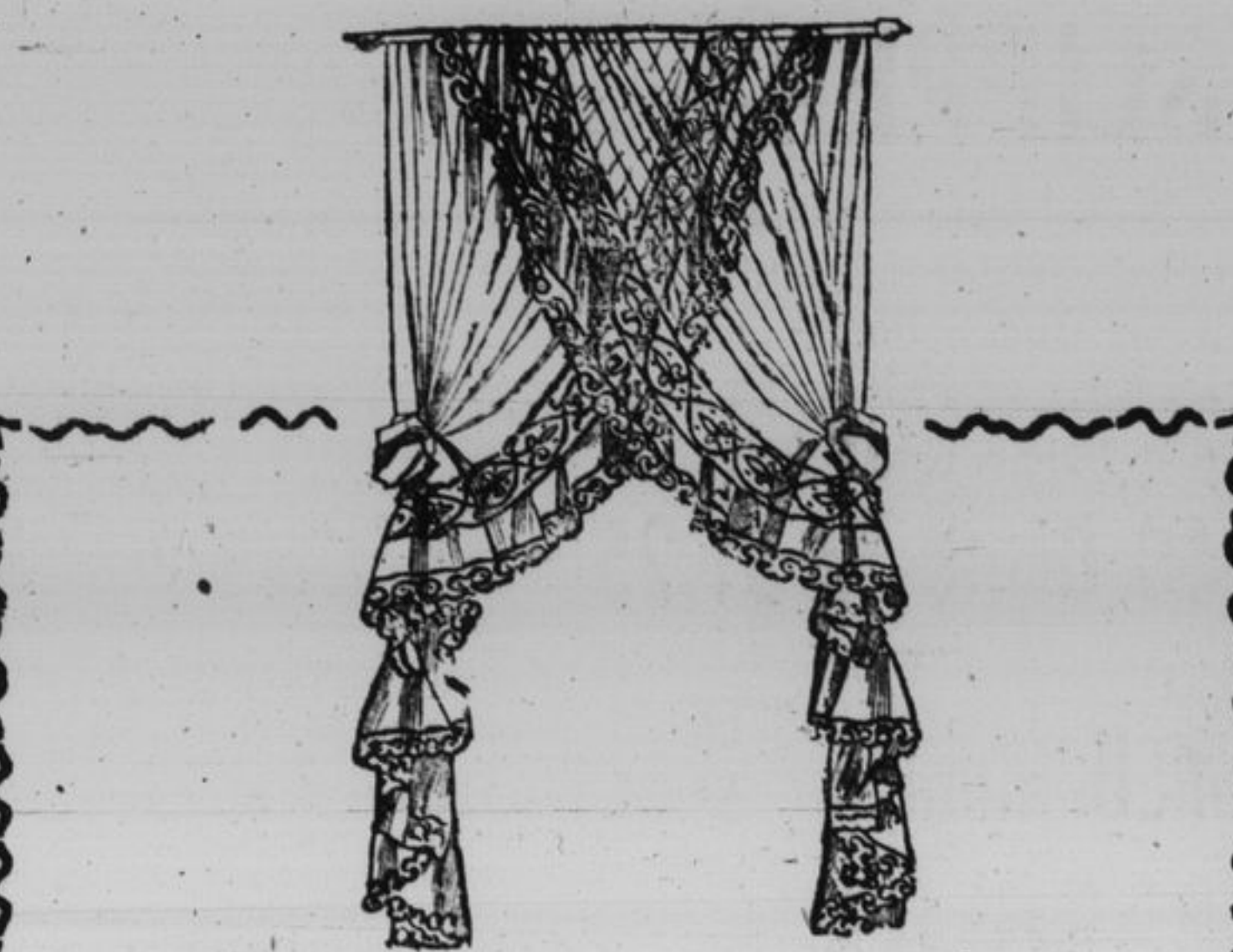
A HOT FIGHT.
