SIXTY-ONE GERMAN MACHI NISTS ARRIVE HERE.

Will Labor in the Kingston Lo- near Gem, Ind., was found dead, and On comotive Works-A Desirable murder is suspected. Class of Workmen-Doubling Capacity of the Work-Not ed her little girl, hanged herself. Aimed at Strikers.

On Sunday at noon Kingston reeived a desirable addition to population, the increase being made of sixty-one machinists, brough out by Cornelius Bermingham, manager director, to work in the Locomorice Works. The new arrivals made up of fifty-nine Germans and two Englishmen. They were secured at Dusseldorf, Germany, without any difficulty, and were selected from over 1,300 personal applicant; and all hear testimonials of being first-class

Mr. Bermingham left here on October 23rd, saiting from New York on the 26th. He went direct to Germany via England, and made his way to Dusse dorf, near Cologne, a city of upwards of 200,000 inhabitants. It is situated close to Essen, where is located Krupp's famous gun works.

Mr. Bermingham was seen to-day and asked about his' trip. He graciously gave an outline of it, and all information connected with the emloyment of the new arrivals. Said

"I went direct to Dusseldorf, which s the centre of the iron manufacturing industry in Germany. In that city and immediate vicinity there are fully 3,000 itle, skilled mechanics. In or der to test the efficacy of newspaper advertising, I inserted a small ad vertisement, about four lines length, in a morning newspaper, di recting machinists desiring employment in Canada to call at a certain address. Before noon over 600 had applied, while letters poured in by the bushel; these, of course, were not opened, for the reason that time would not permit, and secondly, he cause we had a sufficient number.

"I might add that in Germany it is ustomary for mechanics to secure testimonials from all employers, beginning with the one with whom they erved their apprenticeship. Upon entering a new potition, these testimonials are surrendered, and returned upon leaving. In this way a mechanic's career is followed closely. Well, have in my possession the highest testimonials concerning these men. They are the cream of the 1,300 or more who personally applied for engagement. They are a desirable class of nen to bring to any community, ome of them being college graduates. Most of them have been employed in locomotive construction; some of them vere formerly employed in the great Krupp gun works, but all are firstlass, skilled workmen.

"I want to add, that these men have not been brought here because of he late strike; they have not come to take the place of anybody, but have been brought to Kingston beause of a determination of the man agement to increase the output of the works. This could be done in two vays. To either increase the capacity of the machinery, by adding additionil machines, or by doubling the numper of workmen. We choose the latter method, hence the necessity of securng skilled workmen. SHIPWRECK MARINERS SAV ED WHEN END IS NEAR.

Stormy Sea in Open Boat-Captain and Crew of the American Schooner Pendleton Brothers Suffer Nineteen Hours and are Nearly Exhausted When Picked up.

New York, Dec. 1.-The Quebec company's steamer Fontabelle, which arrived yesterday from the West Indies, brought eight shipwrecked mariners who were picked up at sea in an open boat on Saturday evening. The shipwrecked men were Capt. W. G. Kneeland and the crew of seven men of the American schooner Pendleton Broth

The Pendleton Brothers left New York on November 26th, with a cargo of cement for Mobile. Almost from the start the schooner had bad weather. The vessel strained badly and began incorporation for a company having

On the previous voyage the schooner had carried a cargo of coal, which choked the pumps. This condition was not discovered until they were brought into use and in consequence the water gained rapidly before they could be
