WOMAN WHO ORGANIZED W.C.T.U. IN ONTARIO.

A Sketch of the Work of Mrs. Letitia Youmans, of Picton—Addresses in Favor of Temperance—A Writer's Opinions.

Picton, Dec. 1.—(To the Editor): A little less than thirty years ago, in September, 1875, the Dominion government called for a temperance convention to be held in Montreal, asking temperance organizations to send delegates. They came from all over the Dominion, and among them was Mrs. Letitia Youmans, of Picton, Ont.

Atter the Montreal convention requests came pouring in to Mrs. Youmans from all sides, asking her to come and get the women organized and to work. And one of the very first requests that came to her was from Colborne. A convention was to be held there with the object of uniting two orders of Templars, and an invitation came to Mrs. Youmans to be one of the speakers in the mass meetings. To go or not to go, that was the question. For Colborne, though not Mrs. Youmans's birthplace, was, nevertheless, the town where she had passed her girlhood and where she had received her education, and where her father, John Creighton, had been in business during the last twenty years of his life. And she remembered that "A prophet is not without honor save in his own country." Besides which, says she "Colborne was always a conservative town, adhering tenaciously to time-honored ways. What was popularly known as woman's rights was in this town at a discount. Strong-minded women and blue stockings were below par."

was over, a choking sensation in her case "which threatened to obstruct utterance," she talked for over an hour without a written note of any kind, not to advocate "women's rights," as she assured them, but to reiterate against women's and children's wrong.

There were thirteen hundred present, and the criticism was mostly favorable. She had no sooner got through with her lecture in Colborne than, through The Temperance Reformation Society of Toronto, she received an invitation to go and organize the ladies of that city. Arrangements were made for a number of public meetings in the different churches of Toronto, and in public halls, etc. She found the ladies earnest and zealous, but they already had so much work on their hands, such as relieving the poor, visiting the hospitals, and the like, that they thought it would not be advisable to undertake any more. She asked them what was the cause of all this work? And their reply was, "The liquor traffic to a very great extent." Then she asked them if it would not be better to drop that work and concentrate their efforts on the cause of the poor, etc., she returning after them a temporary absence found the house in the utmost consternation—servants busy with dippers and mops, trying to dry up the water that was flowing over the floor. She inquired, "Have you examined the faucet?" The answer was, "No, indeed, ma'am! We have not had time to look at the faucet." She examined it herself, and finding it open turned off the water. The women, however, thought she was the minister of the reason of it. He said "In the United States alone, every eight minutes a drunkard dies, and the bell is tolling for their lost souls." "And," said Mrs. Youmans, "would that bell were suspended in the dome of the Dominion parliament that, when the prohibition question is put, it might toll every time a drunkard dies in Canada."

After mentioning several other places where she visited the victims of the traffic, as the women's prison, the Haven, etc., she says: "The place I visited was the great distillery." And, as the gentleman accompanying her was an influential citizen, every courtesy was shown her, and any information she wished was given. She was told that during the working season they employed seventy men, consumed forty tons of coal per day, ground up 9,000 gallons of grain, and turned out 9,000 gallons of proof spirits, and that moreover the institution was run on temperance principles. On her asking how that was, the official said: "Well, it is this way: if we find a man in our employment intoxicated we dismiss him at once." "Oh," said Mrs. Youmans, "this is the first time I ever knew there was a prohibitory law in force in Goodolphus distillery. Then you must admit that the article you manufacture incapacitates, both mentally and physically, for any useful employment."
