

Benton Harbor, Mich., Dec. 4.-After thirty years' absence and supposed to be dead, Mrs. Martha Conrad met at her home in this city her first hus-Mrs. Conrad, thirty years ago was

Three months after the wedding Berry bade his wife good-bye for a business trip to Benton Harbor, assuring his wife that he would return in twenty-four hours. After six months' absence the heartbroken wife was driven to anguish by a message from a woman claiming to be Berry's wife, informing her that Berry was in a dying condition at his home in Ohio and in his delirium called "Martha" so frequently that if she wished to see

him alive to come at once. Though urged to go by her family and friends the young bride met her fate with an iron will, and remained in Dowagiac, leaving the unfaithful
