Makers of Silver Dollars Arrested in Detroit. Detroit, Mich., Dec. 5.—United States secret service officials have raided a house in Highland Park and arrested three men, giving the names of Frank McLaughlin, Henry E. Rosenbark and Neil Havel, on the charge of counterfeiting. It is said thousands of dollars' worth of spurious silver dollars have been circulated here. Thirteen sets of moulds for silver dollars were found on the premises, together with a fine electroplating machine.
