




## A FATAL JOKE

GOMRADES BLOW UP BOY WITH AIR PUMP.

The Youths Are Now Under Arrest, Accused of Murder-The Boy's Stomach Was Greatly Distended.

New York, Dec. 5 .- Harry Ruit, an employee of a locomotive works in Paterson, N.J., died in a hospital there vesterday, as a result of a practical joke played on him by five of his fellow-employees. They were arrested, charged with having caused his death. It is alleged that they "blew up" Ruit with a pneumatic air pump having a pressure of 110 pounds to the inch Soon after this the boy's stomach became greatly distended. After several hours of great suffering he died. When the men accused of having caused Ruit's death were arraigned in court in Paterson, the dead boy's father rushed at one of them, named Dorn, knocked him down and started to kick him. The father was restrained by the court officers. The accused mer were held without bail on a charge of manslaughter.

#### NAVAL DEMONSTRATION

To Compel Venezuela to Settle

London, Dec. 5 .- The joint naval demonstration of the British and German fleets, against Venezuela, has been substituted for coercive measures by a single power. The object of this dual arrangement is to render the menace of the seizure of the customs and a temporary interruption of President Castro's financial supplies so formidable that the claims of both powers will be taken up and settled. There are rumors in diplomatic circles that th state department at Washington, aft er securing positive pledges from the German government that the Monroe doctrine should be respected and the debts collected without a permanent occupation of any port or island, has encouraged Britain to adopt similar coercive measures simultaneously. This action is attributed to the double pur pose of keeping Germany under re straint in the enforcement of coercive measures and averting the seizure of the customs compelling the Venezuelan dictator to yield to a demonstration of the two fleets.

## THROUGH FIRE

#### LIPTON'S CHALLENGER HAD A NARROW ESCAPE.

Only Strenuous Efforts Saved the Challenger-Work on the Boat

May Be Retarded as a Result. London, Dec. 5.-Shamrock III, Sir Thomas Lipton's new challenger for the America's cup, had a narrow es cape from being burned last night in a fire which did great damage to the manufactured by ourselves, 810, \$12, Denny's shipbuilding yards at Dumbarton. Only strenuous efforts saved the challenger, now well advanced in

her construction, from destruction. Red hot cinders were blown on the roof, and sides of the shed in which the Shamrock III is now being built The fire was most fierce in the fitter's shop, and the wind blew in the direction of the Shamrock's shed, which i only thirty yards distant, for an hour. A special force of men had hard work to safeguard the challenger. Eventually the fitters' shop was gutted, but the fire was gotten under control. All the material parts of the Shamrock III are safe, although the construction of the yacht will be de layed for some time.

Shipbuilder Denny said he feared at one time that there was not the slightest hope of saving the challenger. The fire was of accidental origin. The damage done to the vards is es-For swell neckwear Livingston Bros. timated at \$100,000, and about 700 workmen will lose their employment
