ALPHABET ON PINHEAD

Remarkable Piece Of Work Done By An Engraver.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 5.-R. H. M Jantzen, a Pittsburg engraver, has engraved the aiphabet and eight other letters, making thirty-four in all, on the head of an ordinary pin. This surpasses any feat of the kind on record, and required the best of skill and patience to accomplish. The alphabet alone has been engraved frequently heretofore on a pin head, but the difficult task of adding eight other letters almost surpasses belief. The pin head has on it the alphabet, 1902, and R. H. M. J., the engraver's initials, and under a microscope can easily be read. Three-quarters of an hour was required to complete the task.
