On Wednesday, at her home in Trelvelyan, Mrs. Harris Burtt, aged sixty-five years, committed suicide by taking paris green.

The handsome residence of Mr. Daly, brother-in-law of the bride, was beautifully decorated, and the ceremony took place in the drawing-room under a bower of smilax, roses and carnations. The bride was attired in brown broadcloth, with white silk blouse adorned with a rich bertha of lace. She carried a bouquet of white roses.
