This treatment of the Creator, Father of all, was inherited by the children of to-day, who treated their parents with flagrant disrespect and showed shocking irreverence for those to whom they owe so much, on earth as well as in heaven.

The bishop reviewed personal sins denounced by the apostles, dwelling upon covetousness, pride and avarice, and then took the reverse side, the virtues inculcated, the duty to self, to neighbor and to God. He especially dwelt upon sobriety, necessary in very many ways. There should be sobriety even in sleep, that time and strength be not lost in over-indulgence that leads to sloth. Recreation should be taken reasonably, so that body and mind be clear and fresh for the duties of life, and health well preserved for useful careers. Late hours and lengthened amusements were condemned, alongside with their frequent companion gluttony. Many mistook the true aim, to eat and drink to live, not to live to eat and drink. There should be moderation in all things, and on the subject of drinking, as popularly styled, he could speak without trappings, as one who had abstained for Christ's sake and as an example to others, as one who looked upon liquor as the source of indescribable wretchedness, robbing men of wealth, power and peace, and robbing women and children of homes, comfort and care.

DAMAGED BY STORMS.

Yukon Telegraph Wires are Badly Broken Up.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The minister of public works has received information from the Yukon telegraph staff that they are struggling hard to repair the breaks on the line, but have not yet got it in working order. A telegram just received says that a succession of storms north of Hazelton, beginning with rain and sleet, clogging the wire with ice and heavy snow, and followed by heavy wind, resulted in new breaks, which were almost continuous over 400 miles.

Hon. A. L. Sifton, commissioner of public works for the Northwest Territories, is arranging for the building of two bridges, one at MacLeod, which will cost \$20,000, and the other at Lethbridge, which will cost \$10,000.
