Arbitration. Paris, Dec. 12.-A despatch from Caracas to the Matin says that preparations are being made to withstand those who are already called the enemy. A government decree summons to arms all able-bodied men from eighteen to fifty years of age. Deputations have been sent to the revolutionary generals, still in the field, to negotiate an understanding with President Castro, in order that the Venezuelans may meet enemy as united people. All available troops are being sent to La Guayra from Caracas to Lemoche. The leader of nationalist party, who is now a prisoner at Maracaigo is to be released and placed at the head of

New York, Dec. 12.-The Tribune's London cable says: The Venezuela affair is attracting the attention of tor Power. investors and bankers in this city where creditors of the various Central and South American countries are directly interested in the practical measures for the recovery of the defaults of principal and interest, During the last half century London has negotiated loans and supplied capital for railway, mining and harbor improvements in Costa Rica and Honduras, Guatemala, Colombia, Venezuela, Brazil, Argentina, Chili, Peru and other Spanish-American states, and many millions are now due to investors in various classes of Spanish-American securities from the default of the governments and corporations These losses are estimated, in the city, as high as \$300,000,000. The claims against Venezuela may be small in amount but the principle of obtaining redress by coercive measures for breaches of trust and acts of repudiation has a wide applicavestors. Acts of war, like the seizure of the Venezuelan customs, craft and gunboats, have heretofore been re garded as an indirect menace to the United States, which has assumed a benevolent and altrusistic protectorate over Spanish America.
