Tendency to Grumble at the Terms of the British-Must Put up a Sum Equal to That Which Should Be Paid-Sinking Venezuelan Vessels.

New York, Dec. 15.-The Tribune's London cable says: The entrance of Italy into the combination against Venezuela is regarded with mixed feelings. An enlargement of the area of the controversy has its drawbacks, and it is generally admitted that it would be particularly unfortunate the misguided enthusiasm of his subjects, should render a landing in force and a military campaign necessary. There is a tendency here to grumble at the terms of the British ultimatum, which requires the payment of a sum should be paid to the German government. "It must," says the Morning Post, "be gratifying to the German government to find its primacy in international affairs thus frankly recognized and to have the government of Great Britain thus ready to follow
