



# CLOSE CALL

### THROUGH AN AWFUL LAKE ONTARIO GALE

Boat Shipped Tons of Water With Every Sea-The Thermometer Was Well Below Zero.

That's the opinion of Capt. R. Corson, of the steamer Lake Michigan, which came into Hamilton bay Friday afternoon, ice-covered and batteredlooking. Capt. Corson brought his boat over the lake from Oswego loaded with coal for R. O. & A. B. Mac-Kay; the owners, and now that he is in port he will not, if he knows it, venture out again until the southern breeze blows warm in the gentle springtime. Speaking seriously, Capt. And with the increasing gale came a heavy sea, the wave sweeping the decks and freezing as it passed through the scuppers. Capt Corson made an effort to reach Port Dalhousie and the canal before the storm got too heavy for him, but in this he was not successful. There came a moment in the hazardous trip when the captain realized that if he was to save his boat and the lives of nimself and crew he would have to turn and make for Niagara river. Even this was a chance only, but i seemed better than risking death ahead. The steamer rolled and pitched frightfully in the heavy seas, and finally shipped/so much water that it was feared she would turn turtle. 


