

Harrowsmith Cheese Factory. The cheesemaker of this factory makes the cheese for one and one-half cents per pound and pays all expenses except insurance and allowance for secretary. Those interested in these reports should consider whether or not the patrons shall haul their milk themselves or pay for its being done as, where they haul their milk themselves, they should get about six cents per hundred pounds more. The factory worked from about the middle of April till the last of November and one day in December. The secretary, James Cooke, reports it received 3. 618,573 pounds of milk and made 359,662 pounds of cheese, taking 10.06 pounds of milk to make a pound of cheese. The sales came up to 836,-350.16, making the average price of a pound of cheese 10.1 cents. The making cost \$5,394.91 and the insurance and secretary's, work, \$\$1.05, leaving \$30. 874.20 for the patrons: this gave them on an average \$5.32 cents per 100 pounds for their milk. If the patrons of this factory hauled their talk themselves they would have secured ninety one cents."
