London, Dec. 19 .- The Right Hon. Walter H. Long, president of the local government board responded, last night, to the toast of "His Majesty's Ministers," at the Westminster mayoral banquet. He believed that the British government was fully and deeply impressed with the great fact that the English-speaking people over the world could, if so disposed, maintain the peace of the world.
