The Export Apple Trade.

Cable advices from England regard ing the apple market are somewhat discouraging, especially from London. where prices have declined in consequence of heavy arrivals, along with liberal receipts of Valencia orange which appear to have affected the market for apples adversely, causing a decline of several shillings per barrel. Liverpool cables on Monday were also of a discouraging nature, although not as bad as London. This is quite a change from the more hopeful reports of the week previous. The total exports of apples from the United States and Canada up to December 6th were 1,613,978 barrels, against 469,385 barrels, for the same period last year, showing the large increase of 1,141,593 barrels.


