This oil is used extensively O'Rourke, W. J. Preston and C. by the Volga river steamers, and to London. some extent in the Russian, Italian and German navies. The Caspian railway, 1,600 miles long, uses no other fuel, and the Southern Pacific has 300 oil-burning locomotives in use. So English railways are also beginning to experiment with this fuel.

So far, newly-discovered oil districts have kept up a steadily increasing product. Yet this most convenient fuel is not looked upon as being of sufficiently assured supply to warrant ts general use.

Another most important reserve of fuel the world over is in the form peat. The most productive area for its use is North Germany, and the adoining parts of Denmark and Holland. In Friesland there are peat hogs 1,500 square miles in extent, while Germany has more fuel in peat than in coal. A square mile of bog ten feet deep contains peat equal in heating power to 300,000 tons of coal Ireland has a million acres of peat F. Bresee, John Cowan, Fred. bogs ten to thirty feet deep. The famous bog of Allan alone has an area of 372 square miles, averaging twenty-five feet in depth. In Sweden where peat is largely used, it is esti mated the deposits would yield an quivalent of 3,000 million tons coal, while in Central Sweden alone ne million tons of peat are made an nually and is mostly used in the ster and glass furnaces. In Finland, Russia and Germany locomotive boilers are fired with peat, and electric power stations in Germany are beginning to ase it also. German peat pulp is treated like paper pulp, being deliverd in thin sheets on rollers to drying cylinders. Briquettes made in this way have almost as much heating power


