OUT OF HANDS.

COURT OF APPEAL MUST DECIDE THE POINT.

To Decide Whether the Notice Was Good—Smallpox Reported at Several Points—Increase in Business.

Toronto, Jan. 2.—Judges Street and Britton, this morning, gave judgment on the application to settle the appeal book in the South Oxford election case. The appeal is taken by the petitioners, litigated on two charges on which the court disagreed. The respondents seek to include evidence of the methods of collecting evidence employed by the petitioners. These judges held that, having given their judgments, they have nothing further to do in the matter and that the court of appeal must decide what evidence they wish to hear.

Justice Garrow is engaged hearing a stated case from Judge Lazier, Hastings county. One Michael Quinn delivered to the clerk certain notices of appeal by sticking them in a closed door of the clerk's office on the last day. They were not found by the clerk until next day. The question is whether the notice was good.

Smallpox is reported at the Indian reserve, near Deseronto; another case at Thamesville, presumably from Detroit, and a case at Galt.

The average increase in receipts at the Toronto cattle market, last year, compared with 1901, was eighteen per cent. in cattle, sheep, hogs and calves. The chief increase in percentage was thirty-four per cent. in the number of calves received.

FROM SUBURBY.

A Brutal Fight—Attacked at Copper Cliff.

Suburby, Ont., Dec. 29.—(To the Editor): Christmas has come and gone again, but still in Suburby at least the scores and accounts are not all cleared up that took place Christmas. On Christmas eve a popular young Frenchman here, Frank St. Dennis, jumped in between two fighting shanty jacks. One of them drew a knife and literally carved St. Dennis around the head and face. One cut reached from his left temple to the jaw bone, and required twenty-two stitches to draw it together. The lumberman is in the jail here yet, awaiting his trial and also pending judgment until St. Dennis is pronounced out of danger. To-day he is still in a critical condition.

Another and more fiendish thing occurred in Copper Cliff the day following Christmas. "Mickey" Stone, a local celebrity who some time ago fought in the ring and is still considered pretty clever with his fists, got into trouble in a disorderly house at the Cliff. As far as can be learned all the frequenters were partly intoxicated. "Mickey" started a fight, which lasted some minutes, but was supposed to have been settled, and he started out never suspecting anything treacherous. One of the other men struck him over the head with a club, knocked him down, pounded him into insensibility and threw him into an old building, which they then set on fire. His head and hands were very badly burned, the flesh being burnt off his hands and arms before he was rescued. The latest reports here say that he is out of danger and will recover.

Business is booming here yet, although there are quite a few mines closing down for the winter in the district. Many think it is on account of the depression at the Soo that that company has heavy controlling interests in these mines. The Victoria mine closed last week with a notice put up that all old employees would be taken on the 24th of February.—G.

How To Tell A Lady's Age.

The Very Latest News Called From All Over The World.

The Indian staff corps is to be abolished.

High Constable John Kippist died at Bath, Ont.

Since accession King Edward has conferred 3,000 honors.

News from San Francisco Honolulu is completed.

The general election in Japan has been fixed for March 1st.

Fifty-two men were killed in a mining disaster at Bachmat, Russia.

A Long township farmer has found indications of oil in a well that he is digging.

There was 2,500 cases of smallpox reported in Ontario last year with fifteen deaths.

During past nine months British revenues increased \$3,500,000 over previous period.

The status of the French regarding the French sale of Newfoundland, will be renewed in one year.

Dr. Loos, the famous Austrian surgeon, was present at the freedom of New York City.

The British in Natal are angry with the black and that colony and are anxious to get them.

The London Daily Mail prophesies that Canada is about to become a great commercial nation.

It is believed that the cattle disease in the state of Massachusetts has passed the dangerous stage.

The Grand Trunk car works at London, Ont., will be set to work on an order for 400 flatcars.

Edward Dunlop will likely be the conservative candidate in North- Renfrew in the Ontario bye-election.

Morgan is negotiating for the establishment of a fast steamship service between Manchester and the east.

Complaint comes from North Norfolk that the conservatives have imported a number of political workers of a shabby type.

Mrs. Isaac Schooley, near Welland, set her clothing ablaze with lighting the fire, ran out and fell in the snow and there perished.

William Hunter, Paris, Ont., was found dead on the road, and it is supposed that he met his fate through his horse running away.

Joseph Wilfrid Blondin, Boston, convicted in the second degree of killing his wife, received his sentence of life imprisonment in State prison.

Negotiations are under way for the establishment of new rolling mill in Toronto, which will use the products of the Dominion Steel company.

Among the dubious honors, Lady Curzon of Kellston, gets the Kaiser-i-Hind ("Emperor of India") gold medal for public services in India.

Premier Row made an important speech at Owen Sound in which he discussed S. H. Blake's letter and replied to the charges of corruption.

In commemoration of the coronation durbar orders have been issued to release certain classes of military offenders, so to the Japanese in arc-in-civil jail in India.

George W. Macdonald, the leading mini-ter of the Reformed Baptist denomination in New Brunswick, died suddenly at St. John, N.B., on December 30th. He was sixty-seven years of age.

The Malcolm Island, B.C., co-operative community will import 2,000 Finlanders next summer. Many of these will replace the Japanese in the woods and on the rivers during the salmon season.

The National Review of London, Eng., declares its statement that the German emperor made disparaging remarks about the king of Britain, the British government, and the British people, while on board an American yacht off the coast of Norway last summer, is absolutely true.

The geysers at Elfordale, in the Klondyke, which began flowing early in the month, and which the government had succeeded in capping, has broken out again and is sending water over the surrounding country. The glacier formed from the geysers extends over an area of three miles and is increasing.
