The steamer Alexandria is on the marine railway at Pison, receiving extensive repairs. Some changes are being made to the steamer Reindeer at Deseronto. Capt. Roys is making some alterations in the little steamer Jubilee before shipping it to Muskoka. On its arrival there, it will be lengthened twenty feet.
