

The bulk of the others were adulterated with acetanilid and thirty-two were pure acetanilid-which, like phenacetine, is a coal tar product, is twice as powerful in its depressing effect upon the heart-it will readily be under stood its substitution for less powhealth, but actually to the lives o those who are imposed upon by un

scrupulous druggists. "The adulteration of any drug bad enough, but the substitution of dangerous drug like acetanilid for phenacetine is a very serious matter,' says Health Commissioner Lederle. "Acetanilid is a great heart depressant. Its substitution for another drug might mean death to a person with a weak heart. There is absoluteadulterations."
