DOES THE ENTERPRISE PAY? A question of some importance in Kingston where municipal lighting will be undertaken some day—if the case of the city and the Electric Light Company is ever to leave the courts—

"All depends on several considerations, the most important of which are those pertaining to the locality. Some cities make a complete failure while others are tolerably successful. We know of no instance, however, where a municipal electric light plant is managed as economically—under public as under private ownership.

The success of the enterprise is not as clearly assured under a committee of the council as under commissioners who are elected for lengthened periods and who become skilled in its management.

The man of business does not excel by the rapid changes of his occupation, or this is the lesson that municipal bodies do not learn. The advantage of commissioners is quite apparent. They hold office for several years. They are thus permitted to study their duties, and to apply themselves to their trusts with greater devotion and success.
