CONSPIRACY, OR WHAT? The Bradford people have been resisting the alleged exactions of the local coal ring. It is complained by some that they have been put upon the "look out" or "black" list, and cannot get the coal they want in consequence. They believe the retailers to be in a conspiracy against them. What can be done about it? Anything? It seems not.

A CASE OF INFERENCE. The conservative papers point to the resignation of Mr. Davis as an evidence of the corruption of his party. He is alleged to have made a confession of wrong-doing, but he did not. It is only inferred that had the election trial gone on, with scores of witnesses, more acts might have been detected, on the part of agents, that would have unseated the member-elect. The process of discovery was altogether too expensive for peaceful contemplation. Hence the consent of Mr. Davis to an arrangement which opened the constituency and left him and his opponent to contest it afresh.

TAXING THE RAILWAYS. Under the heading, "Do You Know These Facts," the Toronto Star gives some very important information on the taxation question. It remarks: "In the state of Illinois, Indiana, and Michigan the Grand Trunk has 395 miles of road, and in 1901 paid thereon \$185,036 in taxes, which is over \$50,000 more than is paid by the Grand Trunk on its 2,653 miles of tracks in Ontario."

SAVIOUR OF HIS RACE. The news will be agreeable to most people that the Doukhobor trouble is nearly at an end. The last heard about this misguided people was not very assuring. They had gone on an extended pilgrimage, in search of a Saviour, and suffered many mishaps and privations by the way. They had been finally rounded up by the government, forced into a train, and taken back to their settlement near Yorkton, where they were deposited in a disintegrated frame of mind. The information was that it was only a question of time until they would move out again. The general conviction was that the country was going to be cursed in place of blessed by their presence.

THE MAJORITY GROWS. Mr. Whitney will be heard from. He will not admit that Mr. Gansey has deserted him without some consideration. Mr. Gansey represents Manitoulin in the legislature. He was elected as an independent conservative, and has been persistently counted as a supporter of the opposition. Mr. Gansey has been visiting Toronto, and he has taken the pains to announce, publicly, that he is for the development of New Ontario—which means the development of Manitoulin—and that he will support the Ontario government because it is firmly entrenched in power and so in a position to carry out its policy. "I will not be a staunch supporter of the government," he said to the Globe, "but I will stand by it on all questions where they need my help to carry out every good development policy. I want to see the government in power by a fairly strong support, and will stand by it on all questions which may involve a vote of want of confidence in matters that I am satisfied with."

SAFEGUARDING THE PROVINCE. Hon. Mr. Stratton has made an important statement in regard to the Niagara Falls water power. He says that three companies have been given franchises, and that they are free (without any monopolistic tendencies), to develop electrical energy for general use. Two companies have expended large sums, and the third has been laying its plans on an extensive scale. The enterprises already authorized involve an outlay of between fifteen and twenty millions.

STREET CAR VS. HORSE. Accident on Princess Street—Drivers Negligent. Charles Chambers, cartier, came near being minus a horse to-day. Last evening, shortly before six o'clock, he left his horse and rig standing on Princess Street, opposite James Field's undertaking establishment. Street car No. 22 came along, proceeding down street. When almost opposite the horse, the animal suddenly started up and turned across the street car track. Motorman White did not have a second's warning, but he immediately "plugged" the controller and almost instantly brought the car to a standstill, not, however, before it had struck the horse on the "high" shoulder. The front of the car was stove in, the fender smashed and the

draw-bar broken off. The shaft alone saved the horse from serious injury. But for the promptness of Motorman White, in reversing the power, the animal would have been killed. The motorman complain of the carelessness of drivers in leaving their horses unattended standing in streets along the line of the street railway. Three times on Friday cars had to be stopped and wandering horses led from the track. Under such circumstances the owners alone would be to blame if the horses suffered injury by collision with the cars.
