BOWEN OBJECTS WILL NOT GIVE PREFERENTIAL TREATMENT.

To the Great Powers Who Are Seeking to Enforce Claims Against Venezuela — Engaged in Battle.

Washington, Feb. 3.—Herbert W. Bowen, Venezuela's representative in the negotiations at Washington for a settlement of the claims against that country, has sent through the British ambassador here what amounts practically to an ultimatum to the allied powers of Great Britain, Germany and Italy, regarding their insistence on preferential treatment in the settlement of their claims against Venezuela.

Engaged in Battle.

New York, Feb. 3.—President Castro's forces, according to a dispatch to the Herald, from Willmstadt, Island of Curacao, are engaged in battle with a strong revolutionary force, fourteen miles south of Caracas. There has been no decisive result, but the rebels have gained ground.

Look For Agreement.

Paris, Feb. 3.—Advices from Ambassador Jusserand, summarizing the status of Venezuelan negotiations at Washington, lead officials to express more confidence in the expectation of an adjustment of the difficulties than at any time previous.

An Ambassador's View.

Vienna, Feb. 3.—The German ambassador, Jusserand, in a dispatch to his government referring to public opinion on the Venezuelan question and the British cabinet's attitude in consequence there, says the government is conscious of a lack of popular support in its association with Germany, especially of the disapproval of the middle classes.
