HAVE FORMED VETERINARY ASSOCIATION AT OTTAWA.
To Entertain The American Association Which Meets There Next Spring—The Officers Elected.
Ottawa, Feb. 6.—Veterinary practitioners of Ottawa and vicinity have formed an organization for mutual benefit and to arrange for entertaining the American Veterinary Association which meets here next spring. The officers elected were: Honorary president, Dr. J. G. Rutherford, Ottawa; president, Dr. A. W. Harris, Ottawa; vice-president, Dr. T. A. Allen, Brockville; secretary treasurer, Dr. W. W. Boucher, Ottawa. A board of directors was elected, consisting of the president, vice-president, secretary treasurer and Dr. J. C. Young, Almonte; F. Fish, Carleton Place; W. C. McCreary, Cornwall; A. E. James, Ottawa; G. W. Higginson, Rockland; J. R. Hollingsworth and C. H. Higgins, Ottawa. It was decided that the executive committee consist of the Ottawa members of the board of directors.

HELPS TO HEALTH.
Cold Drinks Are Not Necessary to Alleviate Thirst.
Oranges are a most valuable fruit. Orange juice always thirst, and with few exceptions is well borne by the weakest stomach. It is also a laxative, and if taken at night or before breakfast it will be found most beneficial.

When you habitually bend over at the waist you press upon all the vital organs. This faulty position often gives rise to grave symptoms. In caring for the nails of the toes do not injure the spongy substance below the nails as this is a protection against their growing into the quick. Undigested food is sure to generate impurities and even poisons which show their effects in some unpleasant form.

The longer a disease has existed the longer it will take to cure. But perseverance and careful proper treatment will work wonders. The pineapple possesses valuable antiseptic properties. It is most useful in throat diseases. Shoes that have been wet and have become stiff and uncomfortable may be made soft and pliable by being thoroughly rubbed with vaseline. Starches are often productive of digestive troubles, especially in persons of sedentary lives. Cold drinks are not necessary to relieve thirst. Indeed, very cold drinks are apt to increase the thirst. It is well to avoid drinking any liquid below a temperature of sixty degrees, and even a higher temperature is preferable. Hot drinks aid digestion. If you suffer from sleeplessness get as much sunshine and fresh air as possible. Sunshine is the best soporific that one can get. Wrinkles caused by ill temper cannot be eradicated by treatment. The ill temper must be banished before the wrinkles will disappear.

Canada's Indians.
A return presented in the Dominion Parliament gives the Indian population of Canada as 99,384, and they are scattered through all its provinces. Nearly three-quarters of the whole number belong to some religious denomination, the Catholics numbering 41,813, the Anglicans 16,139, and the Methodists 10,263, the rest being divided among other Christian bodies. Of those not registered in known religious sects about 16,000 are pagans, probably keeping up some form of native worship, but making no particular display thereof and eluding statistical tabulations. From an industrial point of view the Canada Indians make quite a respectable showing, their earnings last year footing up about \$2,600,000.

The Longest Words.
The two longest dictionary words in the English language are "disproportionableness" and "incomprehensibilities," each of which contains twenty-one letters. The longest words in "Chambers" may have the choice of the following, which each contain twenty letters: Incontrovertibleness, incomprehensibility, philoprogenitiveness, hydrometallurgically, disproporcionately, calcareoargillaceous, crystallographically, electrochromographic and electrophysiological. A longer word than any of the above, containing as it does, twenty-eight letters, is "protontransubstantiationist," but that word is only to be found in a few dictionaries.

Interesting Meeting.
A series of special meetings is to be conducted at the Salvation Army barracks on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, by Lieut. Col. Gaskin, of Toronto. On Saturday, at 8 p.m., will be his welcome meeting, and on Sunday at 11 a.m., the subject will be "A Plover's Petition," at 3 p.m., "From Far Away," at 7:45 p.m., "Dreams." On Monday night the concert will deliver his famous lecture, "Queer Fish and How They are Caught." He is a gifted speaker and has been twenty years' service in the Salvation Army, holding important positions at headquarters in London, England, and is general secretary for the Army in Canada. He will be accompanied by the provincial officer, Brigadier Turner.

Marine Notes.
A unique sight is to be witnessed at Davis' dry dock. The government steamer "Scott" was ordered to be lengthened, but as ice had formed, entrance to the dock was impossible. Davis & Sons had to stand the Scott on its stern in order to put an anchor to the bow.
Fifty men are at work at Davis & Sons' shipyard. Half a dozen small vessels are under construction.
The work of putting a new upper deck on the steamer Advance, of Toronto, lying at Craig's wharf, has begun.

SPECIAL SERVICES.
The Hunter and Crossley Meetings.
Sydenham street church presented an inspiring sight, last night, when the evangelists stepped on the platform. An eager audience filled the sacred edifice, and though the first service closed at 9:30 o'clock, the closing prayer by Rev. Dr. Philp at ten o'clock, Mr. Crossley, who sang more than on the preceding evening, was in good voice and his distinct articulation and beautiful modulation as he sang the gospel, made a deep impression. As is the custom after a brief song service and prayer Mr. Hunter read and commented on a portion of scripture. His remarks were both wise and witty. The portion selected was the first part of the sermon on the mount. In commencing he said: "Our Lord 'opened His mouth,' which was a good example for public speaking when they desire to teach. In the beatitudes we have a repetition of the word, 'Shall,' and the speaker said: 'I like the shells of the Bible. Mourners who sorrow over sin shall be comforted; bereaved ones shall find comfort in the teaching of the Bible. Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God—in the Holy book, in nature, in Providence and in His children. The peacemakers are blessed, and on the other hand the disturbers of the peace in the world, if not in Kingston, in the west. Mr. Hunter emphasized the blessing on those persecuted for righteousness sake, when they are persecuted because they act faithfully, for some persons deserve to be persecuted."
Mr. Crossley took for his text Isaiah xxxv, 8-11, in which is described the highway to Zion, the way, he said, in a figure set forth the way to the Heavenly city. Certain features of the way are here described, but first he called attention to the fact that it was an expensive way for Christ, who made it, did so at the cost of His own life. It is a highway and, therefore, open to all the loyal subjects of the king, but on it there is no jostling for all are going in the same direction. Take care, said the preacher, to keep in the middle of the way, for otherwise if you walk on the edge you may slip out of it. It is a way of holiness; there is only one kind of holiness though different degrees of it. He believed in the experience that is known by the Methodists as entire sanctification, by the Episcopalians as the higher life, by the Baptists as the fullness of the spirit, and by the Presbyterians as the rest of faith. On this way, it was further remarked, the best people were found. Sometimes persons objected to joining the church because there were hypocrites in the way; if so, they were in the wrong place, for they belonged to the place these objectors were walking on. And even a high degree of holiness, for getting on this way, continued as they were, they would spend an eternity with the hypocrites cast out from God's presence. This way is a safe way; no lion is there. It is also, for a happy way, for the traveller came to Zion with songs. The preacher then related his own experience when converted, and sang part of the hymn, "Oh, Happy Day," and expected all to at once start on this holy and happy pilgrimage.

Canada a Good Model.
Is the Truest Democracy in the World.
Toronto, Feb. 6.—A News cable from London says: "The Canadian pushing temporary reform bill through the House of Commons, the lower chamber of the Isle of Man legislature. The upper chamber consists of nominees of the government. The Manx system of government is now the same as that of Ontario prior to 1837. Interviewed, Mr. Caine said: "My ambition is to obtain for the Isle of Man the Canadian system of self government. My visits to the Dominion of Wales have opened my eyes to the value of democracy. Canada is the truest democracy in the world. I love and admire Canadians because they are so self-reliant, true and hospitable. Would that the motherland followed the Dominion in true liberalism."

Death of Mrs. Malony.
This morning, Agnes Susan Hermerston, wife of John Malony, 133 Clergy street, passed to eternal rest, after a long illness. The deceased was the daughter of the late John Hermerston, and was born in Kingston fifty-six years ago. About thirty years ago her marriage took place. Surviving her are her husband and eight children—Thomas, Richard, George, Henry, Cyrus, Fita, Belle and May, all in Kingston. The late Mrs. Malony was a member of St. Andrew's church. The funeral to-morrow afternoon will be private.

Albani's Visit.
Madame Albani arrived in the city last evening, with her husband and her company, who will appear at the Grand Opera House to-night. Every where she has sung on this tour, the great Canadian Diva has drawn crowded houses, and it is to be hoped Kingston will do the same. The world's famous prima donna has never been in better voice in the last ten years, than she is to-day. Her company is acknowledged to be the finest that she has ever brought to this country.
