Independent Foresters.

On January 1st, 1903, the membership of the Independent Order of Foresters stood at 295,289, a gain of 2,716 for the month of December, and of 13,243 for the year. The surplus on January 31st, 1903, amounts to \$6,295,217.33.

NEW ELECTRIC ROAD.

Brockville, Ont., Feb. 9.—It is stated that the electric road scheme from Toronto to Montreal, along the frontier, spoken of a year ago, is by no means dead. Report from good authorities states that the Boston capitalists have the scheme well in hand, and that the engineers carefully inspected the route, and will begin operations in the near future.

CAUSES ALARM.

Pope Leo's Condition is Not Satisfactory.

Rome, Feb. 9.—Despite denials Pope Leo's condition continues to cause alarm. After the function of the anniversary of Pope Pius' death, on Saturday, his holiness was reduced to a state of extreme exhaustion and was obliged to go to his bed, from which he has not yet removed. All the receptionists fixed for to-day have been postponed. His holiness' doctors are working hard to restore his strength. The vatican generally fears that Leo will not long survive the fatigues incident to his silver jubilee in March.

The First Black List.

The first black list issued by Scotland Yard under the new licensing act was sent on Saturday to the Metropolitan police courts and stations. The list is an eight-page publication, and contains the description of twenty "habituals," most of them women, who had been black-listed by the London magistrates up to January 5th. In a few cases photographs of the offenders are given.

Church Name Big Custom.

The movement in the United States to discard the words "Protestant Episcopal" by that religious body brings out the fact that the name was never officially adopted by that body, and that more than one-half of the dioceses do not even now use it. It was originally applied to Moravians in Pennsylvania, having once been so designated by an act of the English parliament. Rev. James Jones Wilner, a Church of England clergyman, who afterwards turned Swedenborgian, suggested the name at a small meeting in Maryland. Prior to the revolution the church had been known as the Church of England. In 1785, a general convention was held in Philadelphia, and there the name was used, but never adopted, there or subsequently. Now dioceses are voting to discard it, and to substitute another name.

Watched Developments.
