The Walkerton curlers have had a meeting, and at it, in due form, they protested against the criticism to which the Scotch curlers were subjected, because they visited the Falls on Sunday. The Toronto people were simply shocked by their performance, and Mr. Milligan felt it incumbent upon him to say several things. The Walkerton curlers resent the rebuke they do it in an extraordinary way. They put it on record, solemnly, that it is no business of the reverend gentlemen in Toronto what the Scotch curlers do on the Sabbath day "so long as they do not contravene the law of the land." In other words, Scotchmen, because curlers, have special privileges in Canada, and can do anything so long as they escape arrest. They are all right while they do not violate any law of the land. The law of the Lord does not count with the curlers, though they have a clergyman as their leader, and come from a country "where the Sabbath is observed with more sanctity than in any other country in the world." Curling is a fine thing, a grand physical exercise, but it does not add, apparently, to some men's reasoning powers.

CONSERVATIVE DISCONTENT. There are further evidences of discontent in the conservative party. At a meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Club in Toronto municipal politics were discussed, and it was suggested that hereafter politics be the deciding line in all elections. "The party," said the chairman, "has been out of power in the province for thirty-four years, and there is evidently something wrong." The conservative ship, he added, was all right. It had a good pull, but it was manned by poor officers, and if the officer-in-chief found any mutineers on board "he should string them up to the yard arm." He ought also to "throw any unnecessary ballast (heavy weights), overboard." This language conveys some idea of the feeling which prevails in conservative ranks. Instead of the command, or dismissing some of the underlings who are talking of getting rid of him. The eyes of some people are turned towards Mr. Meredith. But when that gentleman was the leader of the opposition in Ontario he had a hard time of it. He failed in several elections, and was glad to accept appointment to the bench, and so escape the worries of political life. Mr. Whitney is having a repetition of Mr. Meredith's experience. He has failed several times. It is time he was travelling.

SOLVING THE PROBLEM. The United States Steel company, the great trust which counts its investments by billions and its earnings by millions, has undertaken to solve the labour problem. Its plan is to interest its employees in its business. It offers them preferred stock at the price at which it sold per share when the consolidation of interests took place. It will pay the dividend at once at the rate of seven per cent, and at the end of the year charge the buyer of stock at the rate of five per cent, on the balance unpaid. It will add, for every year and for five years, a bonus of \$5 if the holder of stock remains in the company's service; otherwise the bonus reverts to a fund which goes to increasing the bonuses among the other workmen and the small stockholders. So rapid is the value increased, on the present basis of profit-making, that one share of stock in five years will yield \$60. It originally cost \$22.50. It will become worth \$112.50. The servant whose small investments are thus enlarged will be made to feel that the great trust has a meaning for him, as well as for his employees. He is one of the company, and his ambitions for its success become wonderfully acute. He has no grievance, because it represents a vast aggregation of riches. He is a beneficiary, and his personal interest is calculated not only to satisfy him, to make him content, but to urge him to do his best. Similarly the men holding responsible positions are given a percentage of the profits, this percentage varying with the income of the company from year to year. The scheme—in its development and application—is that of G. W. Perkins, one of Morgan's brightest partners, and it remains to be seen how it will eventuate.
