

PREVALENCE OF TYPHOID.

The New York World has commented upon the epidemic of typhoid fever, and reference is made to it in order to show that the disease is not peculiar to any locality. Four hundred cases are reported in Ithaca, a quarter of them among Cornell students. Typhoid is epidemic in Cleveland. In Philadelphia there have been 1,622 cases and eighty-four deaths from it since January 1st. Typhoid is also present in New York, though not in proportions to be called epidemic. It is everywhere rather a village than a city disease. It diminishes with the introduction of public water supply, except in cases where that supply is unusually polluted.

"Typhoid," says the World, "is not highly dangerous. Under modern methods of treatment less than six hundred of all cases should die from it; and it is absolutely preventable. The easy and ordinary precaution of boiling all drinking water and all milk used would probably prevent nine-tenths of the cases even where it is now most prevalent."

So that in the opinion of the World the disease is due to the water and at this particular season. The purification of it is easily attained. Heat will destroy the germs by which it is infected, and the kettle and the stove may as well be used for bringing about this transformation. Milk can be improved by the warming process also, and the invalid can be helped materially by milk treated with sugar and yeast and allowed to become of fervent. The sick cannot drink milk in its normal condition. It is nauseating. It may be tainted. It can be purified and made into kumtes, which is a most palatable article. The well and the unwell can be protected and blessed by a little care about articles of daily consumption.

"COME OVER AND HELP US."

Charles Johnston, writing to the North American Review, lays upon England and Austria the responsibility of continued oppression so far as Macedonia is concerned. He says that Russia would eagerly rush to the help of the Macedonians, hearing the cry of the relief committee, and act in response to it, but for the fact and knowledge that it would be useless. He refers to the treaty which threw the Bulgarians of Eastern Roumania and Macedonia under the British yoke. Seven years later the Bulgarians, weary from the clutches of Turkey, with the connivance of the signatory powers. But Macedonia "suffers the measureless misery and debasement of Turkish oppression, and the responsibility for this lies, not with Russia, who once set the Macedonia-Bulgarians free, and exalted them into a free nationality, but with the Austrian and English Chauvinists who destroyed that nationality and gave the Macedonians up to the tender mercies of Abdul Hamid and his chosen instruments." Mr. Johnston adds: "With Macedonia, Crete and Armenia were substantially liberated by Russia in 1878, and returned to subjection by Austria and England four months later. There has been international action in regard to Armenia, though without much profit, and the great powers have intervened in concert to restore good government in Crete. The work of the Berlin congress has, therefore, been condemned, in both Crete and Armenia, by the stern logic of events, and in Macedonia its action, as we have seen, was not less fatal and destructive. The time is evidently coming soon when the great powers must approach the question of Macedonia, as they have already approached that of Crete."

Mr. Johnston writes like a man who knows his subject. But he has not been engaged in diplomacy, and only a diplomat can decipher the political hydroglyphics of Europe and penetrate into the mysteries which surround Turkey's possession of the Macedonian country. One thing is certain. It is that the people, in their sufferings, in their groanings under cruelities the most bitter in their appeals through the Macedonian committee and resistance of Turkish misrule, are entitled to the relief which cannot much long or be withheld. Over three million Bulgarians are in Macedonia, and their wretchedness is not the result of unrestrained ferocity, but of that awful spirit which develops out of long-continued hostility, of outrages, of insolence in office, of the law's delays, bribery, corruption, and violence. "Above all," says Mr. Johnston, "and as the cause of all, stands the Turk's administrative impotence, the powerlessness of a dying race to conceive and carry out sound schemes of organization and order founded on large ideas and broad imaginative grasp, a lack of that reflective insight and will which is the foundation stone of a settled government. With this power

asking, good or bad intentions, human or savage impulses, alike lead to anarchy; and throughout Macedonia anarchy has reigned for generations."

So far as Turkey is concerned, there can be no law and order. Government with the Turks has lost its power, save the power to crush and crucify every Protestant against it. Meanwhile Macedonia is constantly agitated, constantly at war, constantly the scene of the fiercest strife between the Turkish soldiery and the Bulgarians. Must this war of extermination go on? Cannot Europe in some way put an end to it? The only hope of peace, in the opinion of some diplomats, is to divide the Turkish territory among the civilized nations of Europe, and the sooner it is done the better.

Now it is said the delay in steel rail manufacturing in Sault Ste. Marie is due to the absence of blowing engines, not pig iron. There seems to be a lot of misunderstanding about the business.

Ex-Mayor Morris is arguing a proposition of the Ottawa coal association for conspiracy to promote the price of coal. The city council invites him to take the initiative. What are the public officials for?

Eggs have taken a drop. The cause is not the early supply of fresh eggs, but the break in the market by the unexpected delivery of large quantities which have been in cold storage. The freshness of them is surprising.

Mr. Tarte has been relieved to learn that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has not at any time abused him, as report said he had. Mr. Tarte should not believe all he hears. Some people are very willing to say things to annoy him.

Mayor Urquhart, of Toronto, proposes a commission which will control the electrical power generated at the Falls for an hundred miles east and west. Toronto would be the controlling centre, of course. There is nothing modest about it.

Only three of the senators of Canada appointed at Confederation survive, the Hon. R. B. Dickey, who is ninety-one years old, Hon. W. Miller, who is sixty-nine, and David Wark, who will enter his hundredth year on the 19th of this month.

SON CREMATED.

ONE KILLED, AND TWO FATALLY BURNED.

Gas Causes a Conflagration—Occupants Escape in Night Clothes—Spreading of Fire Prevented Saving of Property. Pittsburg, Feb. 16.—One person was cremated, two were fatally hurt, two others seriously injured and seven buildings were destroyed in a fire on Saturday at Tarentum, Pa., a village twelve miles north of Pittsburg. Dead—Ray Craig, aged twelve years, cremated while his father was trying to rescue him. Injured—H. J. Craig, will die. Mrs. D. J. Craig, jumped from window, will recover. Hope Craig, aged eight years, skull fractured by falling from second storey window, will die, and Sherley Craig, daughter, aged ten years, may die.

The fire started in the Craig residence, which stands in the middle of a block of frame houses on Fifth avenue. There were stores on the first floor of the block, with apartments above and in the rear. Three buildings were destroyed on each side of the Craig house. Most of the occupants had time to save nothing but were fortunate to escape in their night clothes.

When the Craig family was awakened the only escape was by the second storey windows. Mrs. Craig dropped the girls from the windows, while her husband tried to rescue his son. Before he could reach the boy the entire house was afire, and the parents were forced to jump. The fire was caused by an overpressure of natural gas. The property loss was about \$50,000.

IN OUR OWN CIRCUIT.

News of The Districts On Both Sides Of The Line.

Sarah Louise Rowe, wife of Leopold de Carle, the well-known marble manufacturer of Brockville, died on Saturday of heart disease. Two grown-up children also survive.

Frank Ingram, a Brockville boy who will leave shortly to take a position on the staff of a university at Kingston, Ontario, died on Thursday to a Toronto lady.

The attendants and nurses of the Ogdensburg, N.Y., State Asylum are agitating the organization of a union, in conjunction with similar institutions throughout the state, in order to obtain higher salaries.

Ernie Hudson, Pearl street, Brockville, while shovelling coal into his furnace Friday night, found a miner's lamp among the coal. Except for its blackness, it was in a good state of preservation.

William Barr, one of the oldest residents of Bedford township, died on Tuesday, aged eighty-six years and eight months. Seven children survive: William, Samuel and Carson Barr and Mrs. Noah Barker, of Tiesboro; Mrs. Arthur Thompson and Robert Barr, of Burridge, and Mrs. Christian, of Syracuse, N. Y.

Robert Wilson, aged eighty-two of Wilested, Lanarkshire township, went to Gananoque last week to visit his daughter, and on Saturday was found dead in bed. He leaves a wife and the following children: J. B. Wilson of Wilested; Hugh Wilson, Gananoque; Mrs. Robert Poole, Poole's Resort; Mrs. Thomas Little, Willow Bank, and Mrs. Murchie, Gananoque.

Are Out Of Work.

London, Feb. 16.—There was a meeting of 2,000 of London's unemployed in Trafalgar Square on Saturday. Five thousand spectators, besides the unemployed, were present. The speeches were mild, depicting the misery of those out of work and demanding that an opportunity be given for the poor to obtain a living. It was decided to have parades through the streets daily.

Miss Boise achieved notoriety some months ago by horsewhipping Mayor Parker, and was in several trials in times past with Mrs. Nation. She declares liquor ruined a favorite brother. She was arrested and placed in jail.

So Far Some Sixty-nine Are Received. Toronto, Feb. 16.—Eighty-nine applications have so far been received for private legislation at the approaching session of the legislature. The Middlesex and Elgin Inter-urban Railway company wants to make an agreement for traffic arrangements with the St. Thomas railway. A company seeks incorporation to build an electric line from Stratford through Schomberg to Mitchell. Ottawa city seeks power to build and operate a street railway within and about the municipality. St. Thomas city is seeking authority to manage its own street railway by a commission.
