ANDREW CARNEGIE'S OFFER.

Will Make a Grant For a Library on Fixed Conditions.

Some time ago R. S. Bobbs wrote to Andrew Carnegie, the "library lord," suggesting that he should do something to aid Kingston obtaining a better public library. Mr. Bobbs pointed out that he feared Kingston could not fulfill the terms on which Mr. Carnegie usually made a grant for a library, namely one-tenth of the grant yearly for maintenance. He suggested that Mr. Carnegie should loan Kingston \$30,000 or \$10,000 for ten years, returnable at that time, and that the accrued interest, \$15,000 or more, be devoted to the Kingston library, which, together with what assistance the corporation could give, would then be in a fairly good financial position.
