FUEL BRIQUETTES. Cassier's Magazine ranks high as a scientific authority and from it we learn that fuel in briquettes is very extensively used in Europe. These are made from peat, brown coal, and the dust and waste of coal mines. These briquettes form the principal domestic fuel of Berlin and other cities and districts in Germany. They are also used for locomotive and other steam firing and for heating in various manufacturing processes.

This form of fuel is said to be clean and convenient to handle, it lights easily and quickly and burns with a clear intense flame. When made of lignite or peat they burn practically without smoke and are also the cheapest form of fuel for most purposes. Last year 1,650,000 tons were manufactured. Of this amount one-half was used by railways, one-quarter by factories, while the other quarter was used about equally by the German navy and for domestic purposes. The price per long ton averaged thirteen marks, equal to about \$3. It is largely used to the use of this fuel that Berlin, although a busy manufacturing city, ranked as one of the cleanest in Europe.

The writer in Cassier's describes various methods of manufacture and combinations of the peat with waste coal. One that appears to be most successful is similar to a paper making machine, in that it takes in at one end the wet peat in liquid form and by means of hot compression rollers turns out the dry fuel in little bricks at the other.

We understand the Ontario government has given some attention to this phase of the fuel-question and we believe public opinion would sustain them in making thorough investigations in Germany it has passed beyond the experimental stage and that is the place to study its adaptability to our needs.

Ontario has no known coal deposits, but there are vast beds of peat and deposits of lignite are known. Coal securities can be brought from our seaboard at very low cost, but it may not be needed if our peat proves to be as good as some experienced men have represented it to be. The expense of an investigation would be trifling compared with the universal importance of cheap fuel.

THE ENEMY AT WORK. The Temperance Legislation League is a new body whose exploits may mean more injury than good to the cause which it espouses. It is this League that has decided to do a little campaigning on its own account, contrary to the opinion and judgment of many advanced temperance workers, and has put a candidate in the field in North York. The regular candidates there are Hon. E. J. Davis, the commissioner of crown lands, and Mr. Lennox. These men are not only pronounced politicians, but have their own strong views upon the social question. Mr. Davis is a temperance man in principle, and he gave the Ontario Liquor Act of 1902, his support in and out of the legislature. Mr. Lennox has not had an opportunity to do anything in parliament, not having occupied a seat there, but he is a humble follower of Mr. Whitney and is prepared to endorse his leader's contention that what the province wants is not prohibition but higher license.

Some temperance fanatics have thought that Mr. Davis should go further and load himself with all manner of pledges. This election has been deemed a fitting time in which to crowd him with their requests. Failing to get the promises from him they desired, and seeing the futility to expect any favours from Mr. Lennox, they have got William Munn to accept their nomination. The man is a liberal, and makes the mistake that others made in the general election of being used by his opponents for political purposes. The scheme is to injure Mr. Davis, and it may succeed. The conservative candidate will not lose a vote by the incident. The third candidate will draw any support he receives from the liberal candidate. He cannot hope to succeed. Then why should he indirectly lend his aid to the enemy and weaken a cause he is supposed to support, both politically and morally?

Mr. Munn desires to see the Ross government sustained, yet fruitlessly opposes a member of it. He desires to see new temperance legislation, yet antagonizes a member of the government and sours people generally on the temperance movement. The alliance and men who have co-operated in connection with it, are not endorsing Mr. Munn, or the men who made him a third and temperance candidate in North York.

Remember This. Before Premier Ross and other stalwart supporters of the Dominion Alliance congratulate themselves on the popularity in London of the warer drinks alcoholic beverages only with his meals, they should take into consideration that the average Briton eats at least four meals a day.

Mr. Devlin, formerly a member of the Canadian Commons, and now immigration commissioner in Ireland, is suggested as a candidate for Galway in the imperial parliament. His election would be helpful to Canada at the present time.

As a result of insisting that politics should be run on straight party lines in New Brunswick, in the last election, the legislature contained forty-five liberals and seven conservatives. History will probably repeat itself in the election which is now on.

It is to the credit of Mr. McLean, M.P., that in his attacks on the C.P.R., he declines to use its passes, and buys the usual fares while travelling between Toronto and Ottawa during the session. McLean may be faulty in some ways, but on the pass question he is consistent.
