Trustworthy reports are to the effect that many peasants living at Karpovka, in the Ban territory, have journeyed 1,000 miles to Kronstadt in order to worship Father John, persisting in maintaining that he was Christ. They were discovered by the police, and were sent home to be dealt with by the ecclesiastical authorities.

The correspondent also describes a scene he himself witnessed at St. Petersburg a few days ago when Father John was leading the Nicholas railroad strike. In spite of the severe cold, a large crowd had assembled, and Father John had to be escorted to the train by a dozen gendarmes, who formed a ring around him. Nevertheless women tried hard to approach him, and some threw themselves to the ground, in order to crawl inside the ring and kiss his feet or even his garments.

When Father John was in the train the gendarmes flogged him in front of it, but one went up and approached the passenger to ask the famous priest to show him off, even if for a moment.

BOXERS ARE THREATENING.

Hundreds Are Assembling in Chili Province.

Vic et al., B.C., Feb. 21.—According to a Tien-Tsin dispatch to the Ashi, hundreds of Boxers are showing a threatening attitude and have assembled at Yutien Cheng, Chili province. The perfect proofs measure for the arrest of the ring leaders when the whole body made resistance. The prefect has applied to the viceregal asking that troops may be sent to suppress the Boxers. The Chekiang rebels are reported to have suffered a reverse.

COSTS TOO MUCH.

Handsome Estate Is Abandoned By Noted Pianist.

Berlin, Feb. 21.—The Local Anzeiger publishes a dispatch from Cracow, Austrian Galicia, setting forth that Padewski, the pianist, has sold his beautiful estate at Kalnagorow because it is too expensive for him to keep up properly. He paid \$100,000 for it five years ago and has since spent it all. It is said that Padewski intends to settle in Switzerland.

Last Thursday Margolin left for Toronto, but nothing was thought of his departure, as he had landed upon as being thoroughly reliable and solid until yesterday, when the Canadian underwear company received a letter from him dated Toronto, in which he stated his intention to leave the country, and expressed his deep regret at his inability to meet his obligations. He further stated that he had hesitated between absconding and suicide, and had decided on the former, as he did not see that his death would make his creditors any richer, and if he lived he might some day be in a good position to satisfy their claims.

Among the creditors are the Canadian Underwear company, Montreal, \$2,130; Max Margolin, New York, \$1,531; Suckling & Co., Toronto, about \$1,000; Canada Woolen Mills company, Toronto, \$730; A. E. Rae & Co., Toronto, \$111, besides many Montreal firms.

BRITAIN PLEASED.

Appeals For South African Race Unity Having Effect.

New York, Feb. 21.—The fourth annual squash tournament for the championship of the United States opened at Tuxedo today and will continue till the middle of the coming week. The meeting has attracted many of the best squash players of the country, and the number of competitors of the contest giving evidence that the game though still in its infancy, has taken a strong hold upon the fashionable set.

The prize of the tournament is the valuable cup that was presented by James Henry Smith in 1900.

A. Scott, of the New York club, is now the title holder and he will meet the winner of the tournament in the finals.
