WHY HE FLED.
Preferred It To Taking His Life.
HAD CREDITORS
WHOM HE HOPES TO PAY LATER.
He Left a Letter Behind Him Giving Reasons For His Going—He Got Away With a Big Sum of Money, Leaving Only a Few Asses.
Montreal, Feb. 21.—George Margolis, who has been doing business in Montreal for the last eleven months as an importer and manufacturer's agent, has left the city, leaving many sorrowing creditors behind. Margolis came to Montreal several years ago, and was engaged as a traveller for a leading wholesale house. Some eight months ago Margolis opened an establishment here. Not long ago a brother also came here from New York, and the statement being made that the banks did not have that extreme confidence in him that is generally extended to a gentleman occupying an absolutely solvent position. But, he has rashly taken things too far, and a great portion of the goods represented by his liabilities have been chased and realized upon within a comparatively short period, the result being that, although the total list foots up to \$20,000, and perhaps a larger sum, the missing man did not leave \$500 worth of goods behind him, hence the chagrin and ire of creditors.
Last Thursday Margolis left for Toronto, but nothing was thought of his departure, as he was looked upon as being thoroughly reliable and solvent until yesterday, when the Canadian underwear company received a letter from him dated Toronto, in which he stated his intention to leave the country, and expressed his deep regrets in his inability to meet his obligations. He further stated that he had hesitated between absconding and suicide, and had decided on the former, as he did not see that his creditors could make his creditors any richer, and if he lived he might someday be in a good position to satisfy their claims.
Among the creditors are the Canadian Underwear company, Montreal, \$2,130; Max Margolis, New York, \$1,531; Suckling & Co., Toronto, about \$1,000; Canada Woolen Mills company, Toronto, \$730; A. E. Rae & Co., Toronto, \$144, besides many Montreal firms.

FATHER JOHN.

Russian Peasants Still Believe He Is Christ.

London, Feb. 21.—The belief of the Russian peasantry in the divinity of Father John of Kronstadt is still largely held, says the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times. The correspondent reports that the effect that twenty peasants living in the district of Karpovka, in the Don territory, journeyed 1,000 miles to Kronstadt in order to see the Father John, and that they were disappointed in finding that he was Christ. They were discovered by the police, and were sent home to be dealt with by the ecclesiastical authorities.

The correspondent also describes a scene he himself witnessed at St. Petersburg a few days ago, when Father John was leaving the Nicholas railway station. A large crowd had assembled, and Father John had to be escorted to the train by a dozengendarmes, who formed a ring around him. Nevertheless, some of the peasants followed him, and some threw themselves to the ground, in order to crawl inside the ring and kiss his feet or even his garments.

When Father John was in the train the gendarmes formed a line in front of it, but one woman approached and besought the passengers to ask the famous priest to show himself, even if only for a moment.

BOXERS ARE THREATENING.
Hundreds Are Assembling in Chili Province.

Vicoria, B.C., Feb. 21.—According to a British dispatch to the Ashcroft Herald, the miners are showing a threatening attitude and have assembled at Yuton Camp, Chili province. The prefect took measures for the arrest of the ring leaders, and the whole body made resistance. The prefect has applied to the vicery asking that troops may be sent to suppress the Boxers. The Chilean rebels are reported to have suffered a reverse.

COSTS TOO MUCH.
Handsome Estate Is Abandoned By Noted Pianist.

Berlin, Feb. 21.—The Lokal Anzeiger publishes a dispatch from Graz, Austria, stating that the pianist, Paderewski, the pianist, has sold his handsome estate at Kahrnagora because it is too expensive for him to keep up properly. He paid \$100,000 for it five years ago and has since spent on it \$200,000 more than he has received in the past five years. He is now settled in Switzerland.

For Squash Championship.
New York, Feb. 21.—The fourth annual squash tournament for the championship of the United States opened its travels today and will continue until the middle of the coming week. The meeting has attracted many of the best squash players of the country.

The number and prominence of the contestants give evidence that the game though still in its infancy, has taken a strong hold upon the fashionable set.

The prize of the tournament is the valuable cup that was presented by James Henry Smith in 1900. George I. Scott, of the New York club, is now the title holder and he will meet the winner of the tournament in the finals.

No less than 450 notable men and women will be present, including all the officials of the United States embassy, as well as the British and American consuls.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 21.—The six-day golf course race which starts tonight at midnight to-morrow night in the industrial city of Philadelphia, has attracted more starters than ever competed in any other race of the kind in this country. Pat Jenson, who won the championship title last year, heads the list and other well-known Americans are also entered.

MAY ENQUIRE

Into The Restrictions On British Trade.

FOREIGN SHIPS
MAY BE PUT ON PAR WITH BRITISH.
A Polo Club May Leave British Shores and Spend Some Time In The United States—An Invitation Has Been Sent Over The Seas.

London, Feb. 21.—Gerald Balfour, president of the board of trade, in an address to the International Mercantile Marine company that he was confident in view of arrangements, made with the Cunard and international companies, that there need be no fear what had occurred would seriously injure British industry or the British mercantile marine. He greatly sympathized with the argument that the restrictions imposed on British shipping should be imposed equally upon foreign ships using British ports.

If the chamber thought that an enquiry into the matter would be advantageous, the government would not oppose it.

The visit of the American polo team to Great Britain last year probably will result in a return trip of a British team to the United States and Canada during the coming summer. J. M. Waterbury, Jr., of the United States, has sent an invitation for a British team to visit America, through Mr. Buckmaster, of the English poloists who competed at Hurlingham last year. It is probable that a strong English team will sail for the United States next April.

The Spectator refers in very complimentary terms to the United States commissioners under the new Alaskan boundary treaty. It considers that the Secretary of War is one of the most able and vigorous of the Anglo-Saxon world of politics and that Senator Lodge is also a man of great weight and influence and a worthy representative of the best traditions of the senate. With regard to Senator Turner the Spectator says: "He is less well known, at any rate on this side of the Atlantic, but we may be sure that the president's choice has been wisely made. Mr. Roosevelt would not choose inferior men."

SERIOUS ENGAGEMENT.
The Turks Were Decimated—Driven Into River.

London, Feb. 21.—A despatch to the Morning Leader, from Sofia, says that a serious engagement took place on the Washington barracks reservation, where a large number of revolutionaries, who had been hiding in the village of Dubany, near Kistoria, were attacked by the Turkish forces, and were completely routed. The fighting was of the most desperate character. The Turkish firing line was decimated, and many were lost in the river. Altogether ninety were killed and a large number wounded. During the fight the rebels were reinforced by seventy men and this enabled them to withdraw safely to the mountains. The news caused a sensation among the Macedonians. Travellers from the Bulgarian side are being rapidly repaired by large gangs of workmen. This is most significant of coming events.

Said To Have Been Deceased.
Madrid, Feb. 21.—The Herald's Tangier correspondent writes from the Washington barracks reservation, Bu Haasar, is reported to have been dejected on February 15th near Mellilla. Jews, in the city, the correspondent adds, have received reports that Bu Haasar perished in the battle.

Population Of New York.
New York, Feb. 21.—In the report of the health department it is estimated that the present population of Greater New York is 3,732,903, an increase since the United States census of 1900 of 295,071.

Coming To Canada.
Winnipeg, Feb. 21.—Already between 2,000 and 3,000 immigrants have been ticketed from the state of Iowa to points in Canadian west. The majority of them are well-to-do.

Gets Bigsby Medal.
London, Feb. 21.—At a meeting of the Royal Geological Society, Dr. Henry Ami, of the geological survey of Canada, was awarded the Bigsby medal.

The Date Changed.
Vancouver, Feb. 21.—The opening of the legislature, summoned for March 1st, has been postponed until April 2nd.

Rome, Feb. 21.—The pope, in recognition of the jubilee, has donated the sum of twenty thousand dollars to the poor of Rome.

INCREASED POPULARITY.

By His Part In The Recent Duel.

Buda Pest, Feb. 21.—The duel between Baron Fejervary, the septuagenarian minister of finance, in the Hungarian cabinet, and Herr Lengyel, a member of the Hungarian diet, whom he had accused of telling a falsehood, was no opera bouffe affair. The combatants were very much in earnest. The weapons used were light cavalry sabres. The onlookers were amazed by the agility and swordsmanship displayed by Baron Fejervary despite his seventy years. The chief result of the duel has been to greatly increase the baron's popularity. When he appeared in the chamber, yesterday afternoon, an enthusiastic ovation was given him.

USED FOR DISSECTION.
A Brother Turned Up And Was Very Angry.

Halifax, N.S., Feb. 21.—A man died at the Victoria General Hospital, in this city, a few days ago. No one appearing to claim the body it was removed to the hospital morgue for dissection purposes. Yesterday while a group of medical students stood around watching the dissection, the dead man's brother entered the morgue. In a state of tense excitement he accused Dr. Curry, who was in charge, of brutality and violently threatened him. The doctor ordered the man out and on the latter refusing to go he was forcibly expelled. The law gives the doctors of the hospital power to use the bodies of unclaimed persons as subjects for dissection.

CANDIES TAMPERED WITH.
They Will Be Examined By The Authorities.

Wabigoon, Ont., Feb. 21.—A man named Civeron, at Goldrock, received a box of chocolates by mail. He gave one of the candies to a companion, who, upon tasting it, was seized with violent pains, exhibiting all the symptoms of being poisoned. Later John Joy took one of the candies, before he could be warned, and was immediately seized with convulsions, which nearly finished him. There are evident signs of the candies having been tampered with and the package has been sent to the provincial authorities at Toronto.

ATE FORTY OF THEM.
There Is a Chance She May Recover.

Windsor, Ont., Feb. 21.—Gladys, the four-year-old daughter of William Hulbert, found a box of tablets which she supposed were candies. Each one contained a very small quantity of arsenic, but she ate forty of them, and died. Prompt medical attention was given her and there is a chance that she will recover.

Cornerstone Of War College.
Washington, D.C., Feb. 21.—The cornerstone of the Army War College, on the Washington barracks reservation, was laid today with military and Masonic ceremonies. Gen. Gillespie, chief of engineers, was the master of ceremonies and the prominent participants included: President Roosevelt, Secretary Root and Maj. Gen. Young, president of the War College board.
