TO THE COLLEGES OF THE PROVINCE—THE SUBJECT CALMLY CONSIDERED.

Those interested in university education in Ontario must have observed that recently the question of government aid to colleges has been again coming to the front, and in the special interest of one institution, it is contended that no assistance should be given to other colleges until the wishes of the University of Toronto are all have been supplied, and also that no government aid be given to any college that is not under direct government control.

The decision, however, regarding denominational colleges did not touch the question whether there should be one or more undenominational colleges in the province aided from the public treasury. In regard to this question, the two-fold position, above referred to, has now been taken by the University of Toronto.
