A couple of years ago he was professor in the Diocesan Theological College and his resignation was asked for, as his views on some doctrinal points were not believed to be in sympathy with the teachings of the church, For some time afterwards he continued to occupy his place as assistant to the rec tor of Christ Church cathedral, and his sermons attracted large congregations. Many friends defended his position, but he was eventually inhibited preaching in the diocese by Archbishop Bond. Thereupon Mr. Steen took legal steps to compel the archbishop to issue a preaching cense, but the case never came to trial, peace being restored upon Mr. Steen making a declaration of faith and obedience which was acceptable to his lordship. 
