AID MUST COME.

CHAMBERLAIN LOOKS TO THE COLONIES.

He is Preaching a Large Imperial Policy—The Empire Cannot be Run on Mere Business Lines—Loyalty and Mutual Help Are Required.

London, Feb. 25.—Mr. Chamberlain is still preaching a large imperial policy for the whole empire. Speaking in Cape Town, he said his first object was to convince the colonies that the old apathy and indifference of the mother country towards them had entirely disappeared. His second object was to show the colonies their obligations to the empire. For the present he was grateful for the future hopeful. With the growth of the colonies the burden was becoming more than the mother country could bear. As the colonies grew in population and power, they must abandon the idea of the empire—(loud cries of "No") were interjected here—or take the full share in it. (Cheers.) What would be the colonies' position if unprotected by the gigantic navy of England? They would be reduced to the condition of small states, such as Greece, Holland, and the South American republics. Bearing heavy burdens for her own part, the mother country was paying £20,000,000 sterling annually in extra taxation. He was not there with box in hand to beg them to drop in a contribution. He asked the members of both houses as reasonable men whether or not they would contribute a fair share. He would not take anything from a large, unwilling section. The empire could not be run on mere business lines.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 25.—Burglars have entered St. Isaac's cathedral, and stolen silver and gold vessels to the value of a million roubles (\$250,000) were stolen. The property taken includes a golden crown studded with diamonds that was placed upon the heads of brides during the marriage ceremony. This is valued at 50,000 roubles (\$25,000), part of the holy icon, in which were precious stones and two diamonds, is missing. This is worth 40,000 roubles (\$20,000). The sacrifice has caused a great sensation among the pious than the loss of the valuables.
